

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1 Marge Humchitt In relation to Cheryl Roberta Humchitt

Metro Vancouver, British Columbia 1 --- Upon commencing on Saturday, April 7, 2018 at 2:31 p.m. 2 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Mr. Registrar, Marge 3 would like to affirm on an eagle feather. 4 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I'll put those there, 5 the pictures. 6 MARGE HUMCHITT, Affirmed: 7 MR. CHRISTIAN ROCK: Thank you. 8 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Do you want to hold onto 9 it? 10 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: No. I'm good. Thank 11 12 you. Thank you. 13 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Marge, could you just start by introducing yourself to the Commissioner? 14 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Hi. My name is Marge 15 Humchitt. I'm from the Heiltsuk Nation and Ka:'yu:'k't'h' 16 Nation. The Heiltsuk Nation is on my dad's side. Yeah. 17 Ka:'yu:'k't'h' Nation is on my mom's side. My two clans 18 are raven on my mom's side and the bear on my dad's side. 19 20 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Marge, could you tell us a little bit about your sister, and who she was? 21 22 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: My sissy, our sissy --I won't say my, our -- our sissy Cheryl was a beautiful 23 woman. She was, you know, no arguments, you know, no fuss. 24 She was just like all-natural beauty with make-up or 25

1 without make-up, and this was said by my brother Randy (phonetic). He had us -- celebrated the -- the birthday 2 with her weeks before she passed. And he got to say that 3 how beautiful she looked. And he had this really side --4 when she was sitting in the living room of her apartment, 5 and he said she sits there and no make-up, and hair wasn't 6 done, and he just said, he just seen the most beautiful 7 sister he could ever see. 8

9 She was very -- she celebrated the -- a lot 10 of things. A lot of birthdays. She was -- Christmas 11 gifts, like, she never forgot a birthday. And if it took 12 some time to share a birthday, and -- and sometimes it just 13 wasn't on your birthday, it was before or after. And she 14 always -- always took that, you know, took that time.

She was born October 15th, 1960, to my mom, 15 Velva Irene Starr (phonetic) and my father is Thomas Medric 16 Humchitt (phonetic). They are all on the spirit world with 17 her right now. She was also on the other side with her --18 her son, Carl Von Junior (phonetic), and my Great Grannie 19 20 Maggie (phonetic), my great-gran -- and my Great Grandfather Moses (phonetic), my aunties, my uncles, my 21 22 brother Jimmy (phonetic). And today marks the day for my -- my nephew. He was lost at sea on this day. His name 23 is Ernest (phonetic). He was 7 years-old. 24

MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Marge, could you tell us

what happened to your sister in whatever details you feel comfortable?

MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Well, I'd (phonetic) 3 4 kind of like to go back to that day, that's November 30th. And, you know, we were always expecting my -- my brother 5 Page (phonetic) in from San Francisco. He was coming up 6 for a visit. And so I was expecting him, and I'd known 7 that -- or heard that my sister Cheryl was out shopping for 8 a vehicle. And, you know, that's just something that I'd 9 10 heard. And we'd normally have a conversation, if not every day, like every second to third day via phone. So I was 11 expecting -- I don't know if I wasn't there, or was 12 13 expecting her phone call, but I got her phone call that night of November 30th. 14

It was about, maybe before ten. So she's 15 phoning, and she's asking for Page. "Is he here?" You 16 know, "Are you guys getting ready to go -- to go out?" We 17 were. We were going to go clubbing that night, and so she 18 tells us -- me to put him on the phone. So they talk and I 19 20 hear some giggling and, you know. She's -- she's just giggling and -- and stuff. And I hear him asking her 21 22 and -- she want to come and join us? You know, "Would you come with us?" She was -- she didn't -- she didn't come 23 with us. She was tired or something. She was -- says, 24 "I'll rain-check," right? So that was the last I heard 25

1 from her, her voice. Somehow -- well, she -- we made -2 she made a -- a circle call. She called various family
3 members to say that she got her vehicle.

4 And so me and my brother head out and about and go clubbing. The next -- the next day, which is 5 December 1st, I'm, you know, waking up. And my brother 6 Page isn't around. Oh my God, and it was -- he's out. And 7 I just kind of, you know, stayed home and I was, you know, 8 going -- going about my, you know, just being home. And it 9 10 was like about, no it wasn't like about -- it was 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and my sister Donda (phonetic) calls me 11 and asks how our -- mine and Page's night went. And it 12 13 was -- we were watching, you know, this is something that we do as well, me, and Cheryl, and Donda, and you know, Val 14 (phonetic) and just us -- the whole bunch of us. Sometimes 15 we'd watch these shows and we'd just make a phone call and 16 we just, you know, sharing the show that was on T.V. And 17 we saw Phil Donahue was on T.V. And me and Donda were 18 talking and, you know, chuckling around. And, you know, we 19 20 talked for quite awhile and then, you know, she's asking about Page. And I'm like, "Oh, he's -- I don't know where 21 22 he is. He's, you know, out and about." And all that kind of stuff. 23

And so then, on the show -- on the T.V. show that we're watching, a unusual thing comes onto the T.V.

1 And it's saying two bodies found, and it -- it is saying the area 1st and Clark -- or 1st and Commercial. And I'm 2 still on the phone with Donda, and I'm just like, "Holy 3 cow, like -- like, holy shit. You know, this -- this --4 it's -- it's getting close to us." Then we, kind of like, 5 "Yeah, right?" And then, that -- we end up talking a bit 6 more and I remember, kind of, we're hanging up and we're 7 saying our good-bye's. 8

And I don't know how -- a few minutes later 9 10 Donda's phoning me and she's really frantic. She's like, "Marge, Marge, you got to -- you got to go. You got to go 11 see Cheryl." And I'm like, "What?" Like, she goes, "You 12 13 got to go. Something happened." And I'm like -- I don't -- hung up really quick. Jumped into my black and 14 pink runners, didn't even put a jacket on. I lived at 15 Charles and -- in the area of Charles and Commercial. My 16 sister lived at 1st and Clark. And I just went running 17 there. It was just -- it was a few blocks. 18

And I went running there and I come down the alley, and I'm seeing a bunch of people standing around. I went up to the building, and everyone's like, you know -well, you guys are all here or -- and there was a -- a parking lot. I just went right through the parking lot. And it was taped. And then, I'm just like -- I try to run right in -- into the building. And I got stopped.

1 Just -- some guy just, like, pretty much clotheslined me. And he asked where I was going. And I --2 looking at him and he was wearing like this, like, jumpsuit 3 type outfit. And I'm just, like, looking at him and -- and 4 just, kind of, sort of, you know, like looking around. And 5 I started pushing. I was trying to push my way past him, 6 telling him I wanted to see my sister. This -- and like, 7 I'm going in -- in there, in that such door. And he was 8 telling me, I could -- I can't. And then, I started, kind 9 10 of, like -- like looking around and just going, like, "What 11 the -- what the fuck's going on here?"

And then, they called this other people, 12 13 Victim Services, they were in plain clothes and everything. And they come up and they -- coming and I'm like, you know, 14 they took me into the building, but not through the door 15 that I was trying to get through. We went into the front 16 entrance and we went into a vacant apartment up one floor 17 or, I can't remember, one floor or two floors in my 18 19 sister's building. And it's like, "What the heck's going 20 on here?" You know, like, this is like really weird. I'm just -- you know, come on, like it's -- things were really 21 22 speedy. It was really, like, really speedy. He -- the officer detective quy comes -- comes into the -- where I 23 was, and he asks me where I'm going, where I was trying to 24 get to. And I tell him -- asked me what apartment I'm 25

trying to get to. And I tell him, "Apartment 100." And he asks who's there -- who lives there? And I tell him, "My sister Cheryl, and my brother Trang."

And -- oh, I was -- it wasn't scared. I 4 needed to get to them. Why can't I go to them? He asks me 5 then, that his -- what -- what a brief -- a description of 6 my sister. And so I tell him, "She's got nice big hair." 7 Tell him her height, something like that. Just -- I don't 8 know what a brief description would look like, or how you 9 10 tell the person what a brief description would be. And 11 then he then asked me a -- a description for Trang. So I tell him that too. "I'd say he's like really stalky, kind 12 13 of, you know, got a good head of hair. And just they're both healthy. Just they're both very healthy." I don't 14 know what else to -- to say to him. 15

And then, he tells me, "Sorry to tell you 16 this, but by your description, we have two bodies down in 17 the apartment that you're trying to get to." I'm like, 18 19 "No, you don't. No. I think you got it wrong. No, 20 they're not in room -- they're not in apartment 100." I started like, just his -- I was like -- did -- really just 21 22 wanted to get to them. "What are you talking about, there are two bodies? It's not their bodies." It's just like --23 like fuck off. 24

Oh, boy. At this time my Auntie Gertie

1	comes to the building, and she was taken up to the same
2	apartment. And and I seen her, and I guess she already
3	knew too. I just crumbled. Okay. I don't know. I just
4	crumbled into the floor. And oh, God. So they started
5	just a brief, kind of, a couple of questions. I've I
6	couldn't really remember. But they're asking if me and my
7	auntie would be able to go down to the police station.
8	It's I'm not sure about this, but no, I don't think
9	it would have been to identify. But it was just to go down
10	to the police station to talk more about what happened.
11	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I just want to remind
12	you, you're going (indiscernible).
13	MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: (Indiscernible). You
14	know, when you hear something that you just don't want to
15	believe, and just, you know, it just always just went into
16	my mind, just right from the get-go. It's just like, "You
16 17	my mind, just right from the get-go. It's just like, "You got the wrong apartment. It's not them." Just I was
17	got the wrong apartment. It's not them." Just I was
17 18	got the wrong apartment. It's not them." Just I was just thinking they were hurt. They're hurt. They're hurt.

1 my community because I was a lesbian. I'd -- there was no room -- or there to -- but it was suggested by various 2 family members for me to take a vacation. So I was working 3 4 in the cannery at the time. And I was -- saved up a couple of checks. And I got on the -- the ferry boat to 5 Vancouver. And it really hurt because -- at the way I was 6 treated. I had no -- I lost friends really quick. And 7 there was, of course, rumours and gossip, and stuff like 8 that. And -- so I left. 9 10 And I came into -- I came into the biggest 11 party of my life. Came into the gay -- the gay and lesbian and -- all that time seeing right away, just a 12 13 really big party. And -- actually, I need to share a story about Cheryl, about this. 14 I knew Cheryl was in town -- was in the 15 city. And -- well, I didn't know where she was. I heard 16 something like at a -- and I was out and about on Davie 17 Street. And I was in this -- in this club called Numbers. 18 And I was standing at the bar, and to my left is Cheryl. 19 20 She's not gay. She was with a group of people that were also from Heiltsuk, from Bella Bella, and they were out 21 22 clubbing. It was so funny, you know, standing at the bar and she's standing there. And she was just -- just like 23 scream -- whatever. And just going like, "What the heck? 24 What are you doing here?" Which I found Cheryl. She 25

was -- she wasn't out looking for me. She just was
 travelling with some people. And vision was not bothered
 because I don't like the paper in there.

Yes, the first time I seen her was in the 4 club called Numbers. She already was in the city. And I 5 knew this. Well, you know, she was in the city. She came 6 down about a year or so before, I think. And, yeah. She 7 left behind -- in Bella Bella, she left behind -- when she 8 left, her and Andy Pearce Junior (phonetic) had a -- a 9 10 daughter. And her name is Andrea Monica Pearce (phonetic). So they left to Vancouver, Andy and Cheryl. They came to 11 Vancouver. I don't really know how long they were in 12 13 Vancouver, but she was at our house, meaning me, and my dad, and my sister, and my brother were living in this, 14 kind of, like this sub-level -- I think it was a two-15 bedroom house. And, she was with us -- she was still a --16 she was still in the crib. And I'd be going to school and 17 then at lunch time we'd be, like, almost like racing home 18 to check -- who could check on Andrea first. Any who's, 19 20 she then went to, I think, it was my Aunt Gertie for awhile. And Cheryl was -- and Andy came back and Cheryl 21 22 didn't come back from Vancouver. We didn't, you know, we didn't think anything of it. We're just like, well, she's 23 on holiday, or something. 24

That's how she became to -- how she came to

1 Vancouver. That's how we met, (indiscernible), in the City of Vancouver, of how many thousand, I don't know, but, 2 yeah. I always share that story. 3 4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm going to start -start (Indiscernible) talk about -- yeah. (Indiscernible). 5 Are you comfortable with that? 6 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I'd like to share a 7 little bit of (indiscernible) her grandchildren. She 8 always wanted to (indiscernible). I did mention that 9 10 Andrea and -- I spoke to her -- I speak -- I've been speaking to her off and on for this past -- awhile now. 11 It's via Facebook, via messaging -- just via face chat. 12 13 She lives in Toronto. She has two children, two daughters herself. History is that Andrea just came back this way --14 just this past summer. She went home. She came home, 15 Bella Bella. She brought -- she brought her one daughter 16 for a -- a vacation. So she came back home. We want her 17 18 home again. Yeah. 19 You know, I was thinking, well, we kind of

talk about -- Andrea and I, we kind of talk about not only
Andrea and I, but my siblings as well, you know, we have
these conversations about Cheryl. You know, wondering what
she'd be doing, what she'd look like this -- to this day.
When I see Andrea's face on Facebook, I'm telling you, I
just pause. She looks almost like her mom, really looks

1 like her mom. Just, wow. Just, wow, you know. And I tell her this all the time. We all tell her this, you know. 2 We're pretty -- a closed family unit. All of us, me and my 3 4 siblings. Yeah. Our nephews, our nieces, our grandchildren. You know, we're -- we're really close, 5 especially when we -- when we share things, you know, we do 6 7 it -- it's just really a place to share, you know. Life is life. I talked to Andrea this morning, or this afternoon, 8 9 and she thanks me.

10 Yeah. She -- I wish -- I wish this didn't 11 happen. And I wish this man didn't do this to my sister. I wish this man didn't do this to my brother. I'm going to 12 13 tell you what he did. It was a drug debt. I guess they were all friends, this man, Sheldon Caleb Williams 14 (phonetic) is also Heiltsuk. He's living in -- out in 15 Richmond. He gets to give his version, but it's not the 16 truth. And I get to give you my version, which is the 17 18 truth.

19 So my -- I did mention a drug debt, which 20 means that my brother and my sister were drug dealers. 21 And -- so I don't know if -- how known it was in the 22 family, but in the city it was known, you know. And it 23 was -- they had -- we known -- well, we knew as drug users 24 and everything, we knew that Cheryl and Trang were use --25 selling drugs. It was Trang's -- it was Trang's set up.

1 It's was Trang's business. And so Sheldon and his common-2 law wife accumulated a -- an amount. And in there's a --3 it's called a score sheet, a book that's written. And his 4 name was on the book. The amount that was owing at the 5 time with -- 7,400, I think. And most likely he was able 6 to get this amount because he was -- from our community 7 there or whatever, and just -- so it went.

And -- and so apparently his -- his going 8 that evening of November 30th, he's phoning them and 9 10 telling them he's coming to make a payment. He's leaving 11 the next day, which is up to Bella Bella. He's going -- we have the seasonal fishing, which was clam digging at the 12 13 time. So he phones and tells them he's going to -- he's coming -- he's going to come and make a payment. So it's, 14 you know, that's -- that's -- so they're expecting him. 15 He's -- their hours -- my -- it's -- my sister and Trang's 16 hours of business was shut down at 11 o'clock because they 17 didn't want to disturb the building and the other tenants 18 in the building. So shut down hour was at 11, no if's or 19 20 but's. You can't phone them, you can't go knocking on the door. 21

22 Sheldon's shaying (phonetic) that he's --23 Sheldon's saying that he's going to go make a payment. So 24 they're up and they're waiting and waiting. I don't know 25 how long they waited for, but you know, it's past 11. Kind

1 of seems like they went to bed. He arrived. They're answering the door because he's making his payment. They 2 have to answer the door. I don't know what business 3 concluded at the table, but it looked like there was --4 there was some money that was scattered on the table, under 5 the table or -- or something. Then the fight broke out. A 6 7 disagreement, I don't know. Maybe it's not enough of a down payment, I don't know. 8

Knives were used. I mentioned how healthy 9 10 and -- my sister and Trang were. They really lived a 11 healthy lifestyle. You've -- Trang went to the gym at least two or three times a day, so he was pretty buff. 12 He -- he terrorized them. My brother-in-law Trang got the 13 worst of it. There was 36 stab wounds. There was a blood 14 trail all over the house, all over their house. Blood 15 splatter all over the house, pools of blood all over their 16 house. Knife marks on the door frame of the bedroom. 17 Trang was trying to get away. And he was god-damn really 18 19 wounded.

20 My sister -- there's just a whole bunch of 21 commotion going on. My sister end up jumping on, I think, 22 it was Sheldon's back, punching, scratching. And somehow 23 she got a knife wound on the right side of her eye. Trang 24 is -- not sure about, kind of looked like Trang tried to 25 crawl out of the apartment because he got his hair transfer

on the lower part of the door. I don't know if he dragged him back, finished him off. My sister Cheryl was in the bathroom tending to her wound. There was a paper towel -towels that are in the bathroom. She was tending to her wound.

And there was neighbours that are hearing 6 this up above their apartment. They thought it was just a 7 loud T.V. And then, I don't know, I think Sheldon had a 8 sugar (sic) -- a cigarette break because when my sister 9 10 Cheryl was heard pleading for her life, "Don't kill me. 11 Please, don't kill me," he killed her. He pulled her up on the wall, he strangled her. He left her right there, just 12 13 like -- I never seen the pictures, but you have a pretty -you have a pretty vivid picture as we weren't -- when we 14 went to trial. It sounded like a minute. And the picture 15 that -- she just -- he just let her go and she was -- she 16 was dead. 17

She fought for her own life because there 18 was two footprints on the wall. She was trying to kick 19 20 herself out. I think Sheldon's like five nine, five ten, and my sister's like five seven, pretty small. So the 21 22 timeframe -- frame where his first -- where Sheldon's supposed to have been there before 11, and he wasn't. 23 Like, no sober person could go into somebody's house and do 24 what he did. He told the courts that he wasn't on 25

1 anything. I don't think no sober person could ever go into somebody's house and do what he done. He was using. 2 He was off getting his drugs from somewhere -- some --3 somebody else's house. That's how we see it. 4 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: You want to talk about 5 (indiscernible)? Marge, can you tell Commissioner Audette 6 a little bit about your experience through the trial and 7 going through the court system? 8 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. Well, I did 9 10 mention that it was all scary, you know. Just still didn't believe it was true. It's not them. At -- in my own -- I 11 was using at the time and really -- I was thinking that 12 13 they were being protected -- you guys are hiding them. This -- you know, stuff like that. That was -- that was 14 before the -- the funeral and stuff, but it wasn't like 15 that. Got to the funeral, it was them. 16 So Sheldon's in Bella Bella, fishing. 17 And -- in the same month we had to get back to Bella Bella. 18 19 Go to Bella Bella because we had another loss in our 20 family, same month. So I went home to be with my family member on this loss, and I stayed the extra -- I stayed for 21 22 the month of January. And --UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: A grave? Did you 23 bury? 24 25 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: No -- I -- I stab --

1	got through the funeral was on December 31st, the third
2	family member. And I end up going to a house and to to
3	go to the New Year's. I didn't want to go. I went to the
4	house to to party and then I'd seen I was sitting at
5	the window sit window and I'd I'd seen these two
6	figures walking down the street and walking towards the
7	house. And it was it was Sheldon and his common-law
8	wife.
9	I'm going to tell you a bit about his
10	common-law wife. She was supposed to be my sister's
11	friend. She had me be in opportunity a window to phone and
12	say, you you might have to leave here. There's
13	something's going to happen. She didn't do that.
14	We got back to so there these two,
15	they're walking towards the house, and it's it's them
16	two. And I'm telling you my heart just was like started
17	like beating and beating. I don't know, it was just like I
18	had this big anxiety, you know. It's like, you know,
19	they're coming to the house. They come walking up the
20	stairs. Peek over the over the the little shelf of
21	the of the stairs. And then, he just he's a pretty
22	big man, right? And all of a sudden, he just made
23	himself he's like went and heard a whisper,
24	whisper, "Marge is here." And then, they all pop up and
25	him and her, they Sheldon and his common-law wife pop up

1 and -- just a hello. No eye contact what so ever. And I knew. I just knew. I just said, "You fucking mother-2 fucker." Can't even look at me when he sat at the table. 3 He sat like this. And he just -- he couldn't sit any 4 lower. I don't even know why he stayed, but he did. 5 And I drank, and I drank really fast. And I 6 was just, "Fuck, I need to get drunk. I need to get 7 drunk." And I was telling my friend, you know, just, 8 "Watch out for me, don't let anybody come near me. Don't 9 let anybody talk to me about anything because this is only 10 the first month that -- just weeks of my sister -- and now 11 my brother -- and my brother." 12 13 And then, the next day I wake up and I'm just like, holy shit. Just like, holy shit, it's him. I 14 knew it. Couldn't even look me in the eye. I go to my 15 sister Jenny (phonetic), and I'm like, "Jenny. 16 Something's -- something's -- something happened." I 17 started telling her when I -- what happened. So she -- we 18 tell each -- "We got to phone the Vancouver police. Got to 19 20 phone the detectives." And so we do, and goodness sakes they tell us we got to keep an eye on them -- him. We're 21 22 on an island. We're like, "You want us to what?" "Yeah. Can you keep posts? Can you keep us posted on his 23 moments?" "Well, okay." And then, so we did. 24 I ended up coming back to Vancouver because, 25

you know, I reside here. The month of January passed, and Sheldon -- we kept track of him and then he comes back to Vancouver. So we told the -- we, you know, we phoned the detectives telling when his departure is, and when he's going to be coming back to Vancouver. And -- and then, so they're, "Okay. Thank you." And thanking us for keeping an eye on him.

And they had a 24-hour surveillance on him, 8 and then they arrested him. Or no, they -- they took him 9 10 in to questioning. Took him into questioning February -- I think it was February 14th, 72 days. And then, I think it 11 was, like, something like ten hours. I never held a vigil 12 13 so long, some -- never held a vigil like I did for my sister. I was -- I was home. Home alone I had -- I had 14 cousins and family that lived in Vancouver, but I just 15 wanted to be home alone. And -- and they phone and they 16 tell us that it's him, confessed. We got him. 17

The court process happened really quick. It 18 was me and Donda that went to -- because it happened in 19 20 Vancouver. That he was picked up in Richmond -- you send him to Vancouver. He was in jail and then we went down the 21 22 Monday, or whatever day it was. I -- I can't really remember, but we went to the -- the appearance of -- his 23 appearance. And we were just scared. It was just me and 24 Donda. And -- and we walk into a setting like this. Not 25

like this, but you know what a courtroom looks like. And there was a whole bunch of them sitting on this side, and there was me and Donda on this side. And we were just scared. It was -- it was mostly his side, and her side. And then, the arraignment happened. He was charged. It happened really quick, and then -- then we proceeded to -to go to trial.

The scary part was because -- we're not 8 9 talking about scary because we seemed like we were alone. 10 Until we bumped into the Victim Services because they started looking around trying to figure out who's who. 11 And they -- you know, we had some kind of break or something, I 12 13 can't remember how it went, but then we all ended up outside of the courtroom. And they came up and they asked 14 who we were. And we told them who we were, and they said, 15 "We're Victim Services." And, oh, my God, we were just 16 like so -- so relieved. We're just like -- we just -- just 17 like air-hugged them. Just like, oh, my God. It -- I just 18 remember being scared and shaking, and stuff like this. 19 20 And then, so you're on our side. Come sit on our side, you know. And we went through the court procedures of the 21 22 trial.

Yeah. It was a whole bunch -- whole bunch
of stuff that happened. A whole bunch of, you know, it
wasn't hidden. It wasn't hidden of my sister's lifestyle.

1	It wasn't hidden of of my brother-in-law Trang's
2	lifestyle. So it was actually put out more to their
3	lifestyle. That they were the bad ones. That they were
4	well well, they're dead. They were murdered. And you
5	want to go and put them up and put them on the on the
6	papers and and talking about their lifestyle?

7 This man gets ten on ten. He was charged manslaughter on my brother-in-law Trang, and first degree 8 on my sister Cheryl. We're all new to this. We're like, 9 10 ten on ten, oh, that's twenty. Okay. Okay. That's --11 kind of, like, sounds right. I don't know what sounds right. You know, we're thinking, "Oh, he's going to --12 he's -- he's going to mess up. He's going to fuck up." 13 When he was sentenced, I got up and he ran or walked out of 14 the courtroom, and I screamed my sister Cheryl's name. And 15 I cried. I cried. 16

So my dad -- our dad comes walking out of 17 the courtroom, and he grabs my hand and he walks me back 18 19 towards the door of the courtroom, and he says, "We're 20 going to stand here." And I just, "Okay." And then, the family members on his side were coming out -- out the court 21 22 doors, and we stood there, me and my dad, holding the hand. And they're looking straight. Each family member that came 23 out of the court doors, they all put their head down, every 24 one of them. I thought that was pretty powerful. 25

1 To this day, I've never looked in the eyes or seen Sheldon Caleb Williams. He didn't do 20 years. 2 No. Got out in ten. Good behavior. He's a good boy. 3 There was parole hearings. We went to the parole hearings, 4 but he really painted himself good inside the prison as 5 some kind of good boy -- role model. He's living here 6 somewhere in Vancouver. From what I hear, he's got a 7 condo. I don't know if he's got a condo or a house. He's 8 got two vehicles, he's got a -- he's got a -- a business of 9 10 some kind. He's living. That's all. He's living. 11 This -- we feel that the -- the court system really failed us. I know when you get a manslaughter, and 12 13 then you get first degree, shouldn't it be life on first degree? I don't know how it got to -- think it's 14 concurrent, where they run onto -- or into each others, or 15 something like that. That's how it went. We had to get 16 that -- that thing down, like, what it was. We tried to 17 figure it out. No, he's doing 20, but he might get out on 18 ten. It was like, you know, this -- well, he got out on 19 20 ten. Yeah.

I'll mention to you that Cheryl and Trang,
because they died together here in the city, they're buried
here in the city together. They're buried together here in
the city. Trang's from -- his last name is Lam. He's from
Vietnam. He has a sister here that was living here at the

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1 time. And it was a quick decision between the two families to keep them together. It was a quick decision for --2 yeah, to -- to keep them together. And the daughter, 3 Andrea, was the one that picked the burial spot for them. 4 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Do you want to talk 5 about the experiences (indiscernible)? 6 7 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. Yeah. MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Yeah? 8 9 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I'm going to take a break. (Indiscernible) break. 10 11 MR. CHRISTIAN ROCK: (Indiscernible). MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Commissioner Audette? 12 13 Commissioner? Commissioner Audette, can we take a tenminute break? 14 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I'll just go to the 15 washroom. 16 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Okay. 17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You're doing such a 18 qood job. 19 20 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Thank you. (SHORT PAUSE) 21 22 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: ... your -- the time you spent with your sister before she passed? 23 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. The summer of 24 '93, right. Before the summer of '93, she was 25

traditionally adopted into the Thompson (phonetic) of the Heiltsuk. This was her -- her residential school sister. And they were very close and they -- they agreed to traditionally adopt my sister Cheryl.

Prior to this, my sister Cheryl did not 5 really want to identify herself as a Aboriginal woman. 6 I -- I don't know what -- what -- I probably do know the 7 reasons why. But when she was going home to the ceremony 8 of -- to be traditional adoption, there was this great 9 10 beautiful transformation that I'd seen. She then 11 identified herself as accepted, I don't know what the word is, she's Heiltsuk Aboriginal woman. When I had seen her 12 13 come out in this ceremony of her adoption, she was wearing a really nice regalia, danced out and, my gosh, she was 14 beautiful. 15

So the next thing that happened was they got 16 to us, which was the canoe gathering in Bella Bella. And 17 we all were home. We all went home. And it was also my 18 dad's birthday that month, and we're his -- we were all his 19 20 birthday gift. He was really happy for us all to be home, all his children, and his grandchildren. She was there. 21 22 Sure wish she was here. I'd wish she was here. My sissy, auntie, mother, grandmother, daughter, niece, she was 23 there. It's -- it -- it was really nice. Nice, you know, 24 other than this all -- like, us all being home, you know, 25

1 to see her transform.

2 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Marge -- Marge -- it's 3 not on. Marge, can you tell us a little bit about your 4 work as a grassroot warrior woman, and the outreach --5 outreach you -- out -- outreach you do in Downtown Eastside 6 Vancouver?

MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. I had my -- I had 7 my -- I mentioned I came in, and I came in partying. You 8 know, and I basically partied myself out on the streets as 9 10 an addict. And I was an alcoholic. At the time, more as an addict. And I was -- I was diagnosed with a -- a 11 multiple personality disorder. And it's -- after I'd come 12 13 out of -- when I started slowing down on my crack cocaine use, and how do they say, I had -- that -- that I started 14 doing my turnaround because I was in some situations of 15 domestic. I was in the situation of addiction. 16

And I would -- I -- I remember one morning I 17 was walking down Hasting. And it was like 7 o'clock in the 18 morning, and I was just walking home. There was nobody 19 20 around, there's no johns, there's no, you know, nothing in my pocket. I remember walking down Hasting and all I could 21 22 see was these chuck (phonetic), chuck, chuck. Just these -- these, like, string of green lights. And I was so 23 tired. And I started shaking my head, and I was just going 24 like, I ain't doing this. I ain't doing this anymore. So 25

1 I started making things better.

I started -- I left my abusive relationship. 2 And I got out living on my own. First time living on my 3 own in about maybe 13, 14 years. And then, that was scary 4 too. Because I was making this, somewhat of a transition. 5 And I just -- I -- I started putting challenges for things 6 in front of me. I did -- I did a 13-week life skill 7 course. I was going, what? Thirteen-week life skill 8 course. I still got crack cocaine in my head and my brain 9 10 cells. How do you do a 13-week life skill course? Well, I 11 did it. Then, I was trying to figure out what else to do. I then cross paths with the lady that helped 12 13 us in the -- in our murder trial. Her name is Freda Ens. And I -- it was a very short bus ride. I knew that the 14 Pickton trial was happening. I really think all society 15 knew this trial was happening. And I asked -- whispered to 16 Freda, "So how are things going out there?" And she 17 kneeled into me and she says, "Well, it's going okay. But, 18 we don't have any support. Maybe you should come out. 19 20 You're not a -- which -- you're a victim. Not of the Pickton trial, but you're a victim. Come out and give --21 22 give support." This was said to me on a Friday. On the Monday, I went out to that building. 23

I was very nervous. Still crack in mysystem. Still using crack. I thought I was going to be

1 out at this trial for a week or two. That week or two turned into a month. I was sitting there, it's like, holy 2 shit, I'm doing something. And I was like, "I got to tell 3 somebody." And I picked up the word debriefing. So I went 4 and I started debriefing in the Downtown Eastside. This 5 month I'm talking about, turned into six months. I stayed 6 out there for six months. I was debriefing about the 7 Pickton trial. And I'll never forget how that went down. 8

9 I was talking to -- I went down to the 10 Women's Centre and the Elder was in the -- in the building, 11 and it was -- her name was Reta Blind, who is now my in-law -- out-law. She's the in-law, and I'm the out-law. And I 12 13 went to go talk to her and went into her office and started telling her with all the stuff I'm doing. "I'm doing this. 14 And oh, yeah, I'm doing this." And all -- it's just like, 15 I'm doing this, and I'm doing this, and I'm doing that, and 16 all that kind of stuff. 17

And I got up and started walking out. I 18 went, "Oh, God. I forgot." So I -- she was still in her 19 20 office, and I walked back in and I said, "Oh, yeah, I'm out at the trial." And she just -- she kind of, "Oh." And I 21 22 said, "I'm out at the Pickton trial." And she was -- her hands were twiddling around, I don't know, we seen her 23 twiddle around with her hands, but she -- her hands were 24 moving like this. And she went, "Oh, okay." And she told 25

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1 me to -- she goes, "Give me your hand." So I gave her -- I put my hand on her hand. She put her hand on top of my hand. And she said, "You're the one. You're the strong one." And I just, "Oh, gosh." I was like, "Okay. I'm --I'm going to go back out."

And I stayed out there. And I was -- it's 6 pretty -- pretty hard, but it was one of -- a -- a pretty 7 big turn around for me, for what is happening here today. I 8 then did other -- other work in the Downtown Eastside. And 9 I just did it all from my heart, with no pay. I got 10 guidance from Elders, guidance from the community, and I 11 just started doing all kinds of work. And then, I got 12 13 pretty good at it. I've given support right in the domestic field, right down to apprehension of children. 14

And -- and then, just -- and now, getting 15 paid on a different field, which is the biggest call of the 16 overdose crisis that's happening. I never thought I'd ever 17 fall into a field like this. And I think it was -- I'm not 18 saying it was right or anything, but I -- I fell into it. 19 20 But it was only six months ago now. But comfortable doing the work that I do. And I'm quite comfortable being in the 21 22 Downtown Eastside for whatever reason. That's about it.

23 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Do you want to share
24 your story about your grannie now?

MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: M'hm.

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1 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Yeah? Just go on to 2 that story. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. 3 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Okay. 4 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. Going to end on 5 a good note. 6 7 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Yes. Tell them about 8 your gran. 9 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I'm going to end on a good note. 10 11 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: M'hm. Okay. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I wish I -- look at how 12 13 relaxed I'm getting here. **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Huh? 14 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: I said, "Look at how 15 relaxed I'm getting here." On a good note, and I always 16 like to leave on a good note, my grannie -- when I was 17 home, I was running around in my Grannie's house and I was 18 going to watch -- or going to -- yeah, well, to me, watch 19 20 our witness it's called, my first potlatch. And I was bombing around the house, and bombing there in the house 21 22 and then she just stopped me and said, "Marge, what are you doing?" And I just stopped and I said, "Oh." I said, 23 "I'm -- I'm going up to the hall. I'm going up to the 24 community hall. I'm going to watch --" Because I was just 25

1 excited, "I'm going to the -- the potlatch." And then she 2 goes, "Oh, well, (indiscernible) sit down." I was like, 3 "Okay." So I sat down.

My grannie was bedridden. She had two 4 strokes. And I sat down and then she says, "Okay. I'm 5 going to tell you, when you're there, just don't fool 6 around. And listen." You know, she's like nodding away. 7 "Yes. Okay. Okay. Yes, Grannie." And -- and then she 8 says, "Don't leave until the business is done." Well, I 9 thought it was going to be one day, you know. It turned 10 out to be three days, so I was going back. But I listened 11 to my grannie. To this day, I hold that. 12

MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Now, I'm ask if 13 Commissioner Audette has any questions or anything, okay? 14 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 15 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: Okay. Commissioner 16 Audette, do you have any comments or questions? 17 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Merci 18 beaucoup, Maître Thomas. First of all, I have to say, 19 20 thank you. Thank you for -- for your -- for you to be here and share your truth. And to show the love and respect for 21 22 your sister. Thank you. Merci. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 23

24 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: You said
 25 you -- you had to leave your community because of a --

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because you're lesbian. 1 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 2 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: They said you 3 have to go because of that? 4 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Well --5 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: They made you 6 understand that. 7 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. It wasn't --8 they didn't tell me to leave, it was suggested. 9 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: How -- how 10 did you react about that? 11 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Well, of course, I was 12 13 upset. I was -- I was drinking quite a bit at the time. I was drinking a lot. And so, like I said, I'd -- I'd lost 14 and, you know, we'd been outed and, you know, not having 15 the -- the backbone or was -- the backbone of my family is, 16 you know, it hurt. And I -- and I just left. 17 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yeah. It 18 does hurt. Yeah. And too many of our brothers and sister 19 20 across Canada had to go through, and still today, just because they love a man, or they love a woman. And I don't 21 22 think it's a -- a -- fair or acceptable. Today, you go to your community if you can? 23 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 24 25 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: And walk very

1 proud? MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 2 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: That's good. 3 That's good. And what would you say to our brothers or our 4 sister who doesn't want to say that they love the same sex, 5 or they say let's have a woman? What would you say to 6 those youth, or those women who doesn't want to --7 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Well, it's -- it's 8 9 changed a lot. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Depends. 10 Depends. 11 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah, only 37 years 12 13 ago, and it's definitely changed a lot. I see it in -- see the change of acception. I see the change of -- of love. 14 And, you know, I had a really good heart-to-heart talk with 15 my dad one time about this. 16 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Okay. 17 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: He was living -- I -- I 18 was looking after him. And some years later I was living 19 20 on 3rd and -- 3rd and Commercial. I was in a basement suite of a really nice house. While having breakfast, 21 22 bacon and eggs, and -- and toast and all that kind of stuff, and I was cooking away there, and -- and he asked me 23 this question. Asks me why -- asked me why I'm like this. 24 And I tell him, I said -- I just tell him I was -- I was 25

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born this way. And then he just -- sitting on the 1 breakfast table, he was sitting there, and he's kind of 2 like, "Okay then." That was -- that was good enough for 3 him. I think he just wanted to ask me that question. And 4 me give that answer. And -- and it was the truth. 5 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Is that your 6 dad? 7 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 8 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yes. Okay. 9 Can you tell me who -- who is who? All your sisters? 10 11 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Okay. 12 13 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: There's me, my sister Cheryl, my sister Donda, my sister Val, and there's one 14 sister that's missing in the picture, and her -- and her 15 name was Jennifer. And she's here. 16 **COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE:** It's you? 17 Okay. That was my next question. Who are the beautiful 18 women with you? 19 20 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: That's my sisters Jennifer's -- she my -- she's my -- she's my rock. As far 21 22 as -- oh, my. Oh, my. Oh, God. You know, in my -- in my drugging and drinking and -- Jenny used to come down and 23 see me, and just to see me, you know. And she'd just come 24 down and -- and she used to come down and at -- come behind 25

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1 me and they just like -- they liked me -- hug me from behind. And I know this hug. And that really meant a lot 2 to me. Sitting beside my sister Jenny, is my niece Kristy 3 (phonetic). And sitting beside Kristy is her partner Chris 4 (sic) --5 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Kayla (phonetic). 6 7 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Kayla (phonetic). COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Who -- who is 8 9 Kayla? Okay. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: And we're all lesbians. 10 **COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE:** Pardon me? 11 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: We're all lesbians. 12 13 (LAUGHTER) **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I'm not. 14 (LAUGHTER) 15 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Oh. 16 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: You know, and -- and 17 that's just -- you know, when I talk about -- about the 18 change and acception --19 20 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yes. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: -- this -- this is it. 21 22 Yeah. And -- and the love. Our love -- our love goes a really long way as far as sisterhood and brotherhood and 23 all that kind of stuff. 24 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yeah. 25

1 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yes. It's --2 I like that. I like that. It's true. 3 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: (Indiscernible). 4 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: I always told 5 my son, or my girls, but most with my son, you're allowed 6 to love this -- a man if you want. And it was hard to see 7 the father of my youngest child, like, hey. And it's like, 8 we don't control that. But we have the -- the obligation 9 to support our children. 10 11 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: If they chose 12 13 this -- to love a man or a woman, it's -- we have to 14 support. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 15 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: So it's true. 16 Young women are more in our communities, but I'm always 17 concerned at how, also, racism or discrimination is still 18 19 there. 20 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: And we don't 21 22 deserve that. The second question I have, I saw you giving these piece of -- this -- you gave this. Can you explain 23 to me what is it? Yes. 24 25 MS. SHELBY THOMAS: I was going to say

1 goodbye. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Opps. 2 3 Excusez. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. I like the 4 colour. 5 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: I know that. 6 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: And the (indiscernible) 7 have one. I -- I've given -- I've coloured this a few days 8 9 ago. And I -- I call it -- it's my therapy, part of my therapy. And I started this little exercise in the 10 11 Downtown Eastside. I'd go and I -- and I -- I started just colouring -- I couldn't stop. And I'd basically -- I'd --12 13 I do like two versions. I do like two -- two different designs or something. And I got this -- this message 14 from -- from a friend of mine from the Downtown Eastside. 15 She gave this to me, this colouring. And it was in my --16 in my backpack. And I then like pulled it out of -- of 17 few -- a few days ago. I'm looking at this message, and I 18 was like, it's a pretty good message. Today, I just 19 20 really, really, really need to colour this. And -- and share because I think it's a -- I think it's a pretty 21 22 powerful, colourful message. **COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE:** Why I ask 23 you, this is our bundle, everywhere we go we bring it. And 24 I hope we will continue to listen to truths of families and 25

1 survivors across Canada. And if -- if it's possible for you that we put it in a bundle, that it travels with me, or 2 the other Commissioners. And if you can sign it? 3 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Okay. Yes. 4 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yay. Merci. 5 I had the privilege to -- to walk beside a few women. 6 Actually, there's some here if you could stand up. 7 Beautiful women. Yeah. And stand up. 8 9 (APPLAUSE) MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Oh, me? 10 (LAUGHTER) 11 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: No. Yay. I 12 13 walk with you also. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 14 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: And what I 15 liked, right away, I saw a very, very lively, or lots of 16 life, or your energy. We didn't know each other, but you 17 welcomed me like we knew each other. You make me laugh, 18 you make jokes, and make me feel comfortable and welcome in 19 20 this new circle of strong women during that walk. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: M'hm. 21 22 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: And there were a moment everybody was busy, but you and I, we didn't 23 speak, but we connected. I did. We were drawing on the 24 shirts. Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. 25

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MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yes. 1 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yeah. So I 2 remember those moments. 3 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Yeah. 4 **COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE:** And thank 5 6 you. MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: Gosh, I really tried to 7 save that shirt, but the -- the ink really -- I didn't want 8 9 to wash it and everything because it has your design on there. Had my design on there too. And like I said, 10 our -- our art is -- art -- art, or something is something 11 that I do. And -- and I just remember just banging out 12 13 this t-shirt. And I think we were in, I can't remember what town we were in, but your -- seeing your eyes, like I 14 was looking and looking, and so I did a drum-type thing, 15 like what's on here now. And you can ask Kim (phonetic) to 16 sit beside me, and you ask to put something on the t-shirt 17 as well. It was your -- it was this mark --18 19 COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yeah. 20 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: -- that's on here. COMMISSIONER MICHÈLE AUDETTE: Yeah. Yeah. 21 22 MS. MARGE HUMCHITT: And I -- I was like, I felt really -- really honoured. And I -- I just want to 23 say thank you for the work that you do. And I really mean 24 this. And I thank you all for coming and listening and 25
