3	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, we started
4	recording the statement taking for the Joseph family.
5	For the record, I am noting that one of the
6	people here today to give a statement has requested not to
7	be in the video and she is sitting outside a frame. But
8	she has agreed to be recorded for audio purposes and we
9	will identify her shortly.
10	So starting on this side of the table, could
11	you state your full legal name for me?
12	MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Bernice Touchie.
13	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: No middle name? Okay.
14	And Touchie is T-O-U-C-H-I-E? And can you tell me your
15	date of birth?
16	MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: [Date of birth], 1948.
17	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And where do you
18	presently live?
19	MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Ucluelet, B.C.,
20	Ucluelet.
21	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Can you spell that for
22	me?
23	MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: U-C-L-U-E-L-E-T.
24	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, thank you.
25	And then next? Could you tell me your full

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Statement - Public Joe, Knighton et al (Florence Violet Joseph) **MS. C.K.:** [C.K.]. 1 2 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you have a middle 3 name. MS. C.K.: No. 4 5 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. And do you know your date of birth? 6 7 MS. C.K.: [Date of birth], 1936. 8 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Thirty-six ('36). And which city do you currently reside in? 9 MS. C.K.: Currently? 10 11 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Yeah. MS. C.K.: Nanaimo. 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Nanaimo. 13 14 And yourself, could you tell me your full legal name? 15 MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: Maureen Donna 16 Knighton. 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M-A-U-R-E-E-N? 18 MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: Correct. 19 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: D-O-N-N-A?20 21 MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: Correct. 22 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And Knighton, the same 23 as the others? 24 MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: Yes. 25 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And can you tell me

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your date of birth? 1 2 MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: [Date of birth] (inaudible) ['62]. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And can you tell me 4 5 where you currently reside? MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON: Port Alberni. 6 7 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And I'm now referring 8 to the person off camera. Could you tell me your full legal name? 9 MS. MARCINA JOE: Marcina Lillian Rhonda 10 11 Joe. 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And could you spell Marcina for me? 13 MS. MARCINA JOE: M-A-R-C-I-N-A. 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: C-I-N-A? And could 15 16 you spell Lillian for me? 17 MS. MARCINA JOE: L-I-L-L-I-A-N. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And your second middle 18 19 name? 20 MS. MARCINA JOE: R-H-O-N-D-A. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And Joe is J-O-E? 21 22 MS. MARCINA JOE: Yes. 23 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Thank you. And can 24 you tell me your date of birth? 25 MS. MARCINA JOE: [Date of birth], '86.

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1	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And can you tell me
2	where you currently reside?
3	MS. MARCINA JOE: Ahousaht, B.C.
4	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And could you spell
5	that for me?
6	MS. MARCINA JOE: A-H-O-U-S-A-H-T.
7	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Thank you.
8	Before we begin talking about your
9	experiences, could we discuss the reason you have appeared
10	here today? Specifically, what do you hope to see occur
11	from providing your experiences to the National Inquiry and
12	what you hope to see come from the work of the National
13	Inquiry? And please just speak as you feel ready.
14	MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: I want the National
15	Inquiry to ensure that each person in the case of violence
16	or death receive the same justice system as anyone else in
17	Canada, that their case be investigated immediately as any
18	as especially a murder, early investigation as possible,
19	and that these persons be as much trusted as our own people
20	in our own culture cultural trust, be some First Nation
21	or trusted persons who investigate.
22	That times communities need a neutral
23	policing system in order to litigate or in order to say,
24	"That person has hurt me. That person may be part of the
25	murder." A lot of communities are afraid to report

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violence due to community backlash or fear of police, 1 2 maybe. Yeah. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Thank vou. Does anybody else want to talk about the 4 outcome that they hope for from testifying today and from 5 the work of the National Inquiry? 6 7 MS. JOLENE JOE: Well, it's been four years 8 and I would just like justice for my mother. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And for you, what does 9 justice mean for your mother? 10 11 MS. JOLENE JOE: I just want closure, knowing what exactly happened because I really -- I don't 12 know. And I need to know. 13 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, thank you. Does anybody else want to say what they hope 15 for as an outcome? 16 17 [MS. JULIE IDA JOSEPH]: I want to see support for the family, continued support for the children 18 of these -- of our sisters, ongoing support, if it's 19 daycare or respite, education, anything, any way you can be 20 helping the children of my sisters because I see them very 21 -- struggling with life. 22 23 Help for anybody, all the First Nations. I 24 have my own kids and they're struggling with things like 25 daycare.

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: 1 Thank you. 2 [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: I just have the same thought as Bernice did about the RCMP taking a stand 3 and looking at each crime that had -- the way they would 4 with any other one and not leave it to family to have a say 5 as to whether or not they should proceed with a case. 6 Ιt should -- any other cases they're on, they're investigating 7 8 it and that's what I want to see, is the equality across the board. 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Would anybody else 10 11 like to speak about outcomes? 12 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Maybe more provincially and federal statistics regarding how many 13 14 deaths and for what reason because I notice that there's -especially a White person is murdered it's immediately on 15 the news and it's immediately reported. And there's 16 nothing stating what's happening with First Nations. Yeah. 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: 18 Okay. MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: And in the case of 19 violence which was -- ours was spousal abuse -- I wanted to 20 go to Port Renfrew and take my sister away because they'd 21 22 already been in vehicle accidents and her life was at 23 stake. And she had already had broken bones and this man 24 was still violent. And did -- I'd like to know what the community attempted to do to help her. 25

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And I'd like to disclose that I was 1 2 physically abused as well and people didn't come help. People heard the abuse and did not help in our community, 3 including a leader. Is there that stigma toward helping 4 5 abused women or is it cultural? I don't know. And then if you call the police they'll take 6 7 an hour to two hours. Meanwhile, what's happened to you? 8 And the men will straighten out by the time the police 9 come. 10 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okav. 11 So my understanding is that the family has come together today to talk about more than one individual 12 and could we start with the first person to suffer this 13 tragedy? 14 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: We'll start with my 15 16 sister Vi who is just a little over a year younger than me. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Do you know 17 Vi's full legal name? 18 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Violet Florence 19 20 Joseph. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so that would be 21 22 spelled V-I-O-L-E-T, F-L-O-R-E-N-C-E, J-O-S-E-P-H? 23 -[MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: It's Florence Violet. 24 25 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Was her first name

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Florence? 1 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Oh, maybe it was the 2 other way around, yeah. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: 4 Okay. 5 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: But she used Violet. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. 6 7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: She went by Violet. 8 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: That's guite common. I've seen that before. 9 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. 10 11 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, so Florence ---[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Violet. 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: --- Violet Joseph. 13 14 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And does anyone know 15 her date of birth? 16 17 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: It was on that picture you brought but I couldn't see it. 18 [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: It's March 28th, 19 '49. 20 [MS. JOLENE JOE]: Forty-nine ('49)? 21 22 [MS. JOLENE JOE]: Oh, that picture was for 23 ____ 24 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Forty-nine ('49) or 25 '50?

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1	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Nineteen forty-nine
2	(1949), remember?
3	[MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: I don't remember.
4	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: It was in March?
5	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah.
6	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: And a year younger?
7	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: It would have been
8	'49.
9	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah, it was just a
10	year. We were just the same age for two weeks so maybe a
11	little over a week here.
12	So it must have been 1949 but if you want to
13	check and take that picture out of the frame her birthday's
14	on that picture you have, Maureen. Her birth date is on
15	that picture you brought.
16	[MS. MAUREEN KNGIHTON]: Oh, okay.
17	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Well, what I'll say
18	for now is I'm going to go with 1949 and if there's any
19	ever any information that we talk about here but because
20	memory is what it is, it doesn't come back to you until a
21	later time, please contact me and I will take the
22	additional information, okay?
23	And so sorry?
24	MS. C.K.: I was just coughing, sorry.
25	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Just a cough, okay.

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1	Not a problem. We'll just wait a moment for the water.
2	So with Violet, are we here today because
3	she's missing or because she was murdered?
4	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: She was murdered.
5	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: She was murdered?
6	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah.
7	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Was this an instance
8	where she went missing and was found murdered or this is an
9	instance where it was murder?
10	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Spousal murder.
11	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Spousal murder?
12	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah.
13	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And did the police
14	investigate the spouse as a suspect?
15	MS. C.K.: I [don't] think so.
16	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: He was jailed for,
17	well, not very long.
18	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: He got two years.
19	[MS. BERNICH TOUCHIE]: Two years.
20	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So he was convicted?
21	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: M'hm.
22	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSHEPH]: Yeah.
23	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And what was his name?
24	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [Husband]. I don't
25	know his middle name.

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Last name [spells last 1 2 name]? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yes. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And he was sentenced 4 to two years or do you know the full? 5 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: No, I don't know all 6 7 the details. 8 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: It was a few years? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. And what was 10 11 the date of the murder? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I wouldn't have that 12 -- any detail right now. 13 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Nobody knows? MS. C.K.: No. She lived somewhere else and 15 we -- I didn't -- I don't know, yeah. 16 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: It's okay. Where did 17 the murder take place, the city? 18 MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE: Here in Port Alberni. 19 Port Alberni. 20 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Port Alberni? Okay, 21 22 so now what I want to do is I want to turn it over to the family. Whoever feels comfortable speaking just speak when 23 24 you feel it's time. 25 And what I'm asking you to do is to describe

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1	your experience from the start, whatever that may be.
2	Generally with a murder somebody has contacted you to tell
3	you about the murder. So if somebody wants to volunteer to
4	start then we can go that way and just continue from there.
5	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Well, I'll start
6	with what I know but what I was a student at the time at
7	University of Victoria. And she was getting a hold of me
8	in concern for her children. She had had internal surgery,
9	injuries, because of being kicked in her abdomen. I don't
10	know how many times. I don't know the detail. But she was
11	kicked by her spouse.
12	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: How many children did
13	she have at the time?
14	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: She had two.
15	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. So she was
16	getting surgery. Do you know where the surgery was?
17	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I think she was in
18	Nanaimo or Victoria. I'm not sure.
19	Do you know, Betty?
20	MS. BETTY KNIGHTON: She was in Port
21	Alberni.
22	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Was she in Port
23	Alberni for her surgery?
24	MS. BETTY KNIGHTON: Oh, I don't know.
25	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: She came out of the

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surgery and then had complications and she passed away in 1 2 her second hospitalization. And I know now that she was probably aware that she was seriously injured and was 3 worried about her children. 4 5 And I inquired to -- all about them that day with a social worker, Department of Indian Affairs social 6 7 worker. And I said, "I feel my sister wants to see me but 8 I don't have the funds to get to her. And I know she's concerned about her children." 9 And he said he can't place them with me 10 11 because I have not a big enough housing and I don't have a 12 job. I was a student at that time. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you remember who 13 denied you? 14 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [B.] (phonetic). 15 16 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [L.B.]? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [B.], wasn't that 17 his name? 18 [MS. JULIE IDA JOSEPH]: Yeah, [B.]. 19 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: How do you spell it? 20 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: I don't know how 21 22 it's ---23 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: All right. 24 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: It was as B though. 25 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: Yeah, it's a

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(inaudible). 1 2 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Like, [B.]? I don't 3 know. [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: [L.B.]. 4 5 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [L.]? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [L.]? [L.B.]. 6 7 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: For now I'm going to 8 qo with [spells name] unless anybody thinks there's a better spelling. 9 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: That sounds more 10 11 close to it. 12 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: The way he said his name, eh? 13 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so [L.] was -sorry, was with which institution? 15 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: He's -- he was still 16 with the Department of Indian Affairs. 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And he denied you 18 19 taking ---20 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: He denied me taking 21 ___ 22 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: --- care of the 23 children? 24 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I wanted to try keep them together, yeah. I was raising my own toddlers by 25

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1 then. 2 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you know what happened to the children since you were unable to take care 3 of them? 4 5 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: They were adopted by separate families. Mind you, they were Native families 6 from the Ucluelet area where I eventually was my marriage 7 8 tribe. But I really hurt because I've heard they were both sexually abused even in those Native homes. 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Did you hear that from 10 11 the children themselves? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: M'hm. 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so they were 13 14 adopted after Violet's death? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: M'hm. They were 15 legally adopted. It was in their foster home. 16 17 My parents also tried to keep [Child 1] but -- the daughter -- but they were told they were too old to 18 adopt children. And they were very hurt. She had -- they 19 took her away from them. 20 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: He was the social 21 22 worker for Nitnaht, [L.B.]. He was the one that went down 23 there to investigate. So he was listening to what other 24 people said because I was there too. I was not quite 18 because I remember thinking too, hey, I want to keep her 25

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because she was with me a lot because I was still at home. 1 2 I was the youngest sister. 3 But that's another worry of mine too, is what happens on the reserve? Who decides who takes, 4 5 apprehends? Who gets apprehended? MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So your parents and 6 7 Violet's parents, they wanted to adopt one of the girls. I 8 just need to get the names. So your parents' names? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Robert Joseph. 9 10 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: Senior. 11 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Robert Joseph Senior. 12 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah, Senior. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And your mother? 13 14 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Edith Joseph. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And what was the name 15 of the grandchild they tried to adopt? 16 17 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [Child 1]. Her legal name, her adoptive name became [Child 1]. 18 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Was she [Child 1's 19 middle name]? 20 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Huh? 21 22 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Was she [Child 1's 23 middle name]? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [Child 1's middle 24 name], I think, is her middle name. [Child 1]. 25

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1	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And [Child 1], is it
2	with a [spells name]?
3	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [spells name].
4	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [spells name]?
5	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [spells first name],
6	yeah.
7	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [Child 1's middle
8	name] as it is normally spelled? And do you know how to
9	spell her current legal name?
10	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [spells last name].
11	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [spells last name].
12	And so you had said that your parents were denied because
13	they were too old?
14	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: M'hm.
15	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you know who
16	denied?
17	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: [L.B.] denied them.
18	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you know how old
19	your parents were at this time?
20	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I don't know. What
21	would they have been?
22	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Well, I think I was
23	17 then.
24	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah.
25	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Forty-two ('42),

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1 '52. Probably 59.

2 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So they were about 59 years old? 3 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Yeah. 4 5 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: I know I asked the 6 date. Do you know the year or even the month when your sister died? 7 8 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Any idea? I was in school then so it would have been in between September and 9 April for sure. But I don't know. 10 11 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: (Inaudible) it was 12 middle of winter during the ---[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. 13 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: It was winter of? 14 [MS JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Well, somewhere 15 16 anyway in winter. 17 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah, winter of 70 -- 19 -- between '74 and '78 was my B.A. or ---18 MS. C.K.: (Inaudible) the only thing I felt 19 20 in my heart then. 21 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Nineteen seventy-four 22 (1974) to '78? 23 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Around there, yeah. Seventy-five (75), I think. 24 25 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I can't remember.

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: 1 Okav. [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: I was still in high 2 school. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so the -- your 4 parents, they would have been in their late fifties? Did 5 anybody else in the family offer to adopt the children? 6 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Not that I know of. 7 8 I don't know any details. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. And so how did 9 you come to know that she had died? Who contacted you? 10 11 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I can't recall. It 12 probably was Mom, my mother. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Was it a family member 13 for everybody? Was it family for everybody that was there 14 to be told that Violet had died or was it ever an official 15 from the government or the police, that informed you? 16 MS. C.K.: Seems like it was unofficial. I 17 mean, I heard way after through the family. 18 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah, it was just 19 family. 20 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. So what 21 22 happened after she died with respect to an investigation? Does anybody remember how it was investigated? Did anybody 23 24 talk to the police directly? Did the police ever come 25 asking?

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[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I wasn't here. 1 2 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: They never came and asked me and I seem to remember being in the taxi that went 3 to the hospital with her because she took herself to the 4 5 hospital and was leaned over. She was in lots of pain. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So when she was 6 7 attacked she contacted you? 8 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: I may have been there because I used to stay there but I can't remember. 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. And did you 10 11 stay at the hospital with her? [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: I seem to remember 12 it, yeah. 13 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Yeah? Do you ever remember the police visiting her at the hospital? 15 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: She couldn't talk. 16 She was taped. Her eyes were taped shut and her mouth was 17 shut. 18 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Oh. 19 [MS. JULIS IDA JOSEPH]: Her arms were taped 20 21 down. 22 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Do you remember if this was the first time she had to go or was this 23 because of the complications after? 24 25 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Complications after

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1 the operation, yes. 2 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I have to remember her the first time she was in the hospital. She was 3 imagining her son was with her. She said, "I'm okay. 4 5 [Child 2] is here." She was hallucinating. Do you remember that in her -- when you went 6 7 to see Vi, Betty? She's saying -- laying there, you said, 8 and she said, "It's okay. [Child 2] is here." MS. BETTY KNIGHTON: Oh, gee. 9 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Do you remember any 10 11 police coming at that time? 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So did anybody have any knowledge of the police investigation? No? Okay. 13 14 And does anybody remember how her husband came to be charged? 15 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Probably Vi once 16 reported him as the person that kicked her the first time 17 in the hospital. 18 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: 19 Okay. [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. 20 They knew 21 right -- and it seemed to be known who had done that, that 22 he had done it. 23 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Did anybody 24 attend the trial from the family? 25 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I didn't know when

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it was or anything. 1 2 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: I did but I didn't remember anything. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, don't remember 4 5 any of the details? [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: No. 6 7 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you remember if you 8 felt that you had proper access to be able to understand what was happening at the trial? Did anybody assist you in 9 any way? 10 11 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: No, no. That was -12 ___ MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Did you speak to any 13 of the lawyers? 14 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: --- 2016 or '17. 15 No. I didn't. 16 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Were any of your family that aren't here with us today -- did any other 18 family attend the trial? 19 20 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSHEPH]: I don't remember. 21 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Not that you can 22 recall? Okay. And so when [Husband] was sentenced did 23 anybody tell anybody in the family about that? Was there 24 any communication about his sentencing? 25 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I heard somehow, by

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probably family, that he had been sentenced but for how 1 2 long, I wasn't told how long. 3 MS. C.K.: No. [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: No, we didn't even 4 5 have phones at home. 6 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. Right, but 7 nobody ever came to tell you anything? 8 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: No. 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Are you okay? MS. C.K.: Yeah. This thing fell. 10 11 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, just want to make sure you're not hurt. 12 13 MS. C.K.: Thank you. 14 [MS. BERNICE JOSEPH]: Where she came from had only minor communication systems in probably just the 15 main office, eh ---16 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: --- right at that 18 time. 19 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Did you have any --20 when did you find out that he had been released? 21 22 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I didn't find out. I just heard that he was in an extended care now. 23 24 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Nobody heard 25 that he was released?

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[MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: No. 1 2 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so you found out that he was out how much later? 3 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Not til -- I didn't 4 hear anything about his incarceration or nothing, only that 5 it was two years and that he was in -- now in [Assisted 6 7 living facility 1]. 8 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: And he has 9 breakdowns about the whole incident. And I have a daughter 10 11 that works there occasionally so if he recalls the incident and has -- I don't know what happens but it's ---12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So he's still alive? 13 14 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Where is he in 15 extended care? 16 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: It's called -- it's 17 [Assisted living facility 1]. 18 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: [Assisted living 19 facility 1]. 20 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: It's [Assisted] 21 22 living facility 1]. 23 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: [Assisted living] 24 facility 1]? And that's located in which city, [City 1]? 25 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yes, [City 1].

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so Violet was 1 2 living with a man who was violent to her at least once. But what was that home life like before her death? Was she 3 in an ongoing domestic violent -- domestic violence 4 5 relationship? Does anybody have anything to say about that? 6 7 MS. C.K.: She lived far away so I ---8 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: She never reported it. I didn't even know she was with him. I don't think 9 10 she'd been even with him very long. It's not the father of 11 her children. I only heard of her being with him when the incident happened. 12 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: What about her 13 14 circumstances? What about Violet's circumstances made her susceptible to violence? And in saying that, you know, as 15 an example, oftentimes people that have been through 16 17 residential schools or religious day schools, they've been exposed to violence as children; there are lots of systemic 18 failings that can have occurred that set people up to be 19 20 vulnerable. Did Violet -- was Violet in that kind of a 21 position? Had she ---22 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I would say that our time, our experience of the residential school and the 23 constant flailing and strappings and punishment ---24 25 MS. C.K.: Yes.

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1	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: and then we went
2	home to my father who was also abusive when he he wasn't
3	a chronic alcoholic but he went on binges and we witnessed
4	the violence between our parents as well.
5	So she was susceptible to her level of what
6	we had a very limited gauge about what is violence, what
7	is not right, and what's wrong because of our experience
8	with the residential school and we accepted everything as
9	what as parenting was. The standard was very limited.
10	Maybe at that time it was rampant in the
11	violence level. The alcoholism, the violence, was rampant
12	at that time, of my parents' time.
13	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Did your parents
14	attend at residential school as well?
15	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Just my mother. She
16	went all the way to the mainland to
17	[MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: Coqualeetza.
18	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Coqualeetza
19	Residential School.
20	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you know how to
21	spell
22	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: It was in the
23	twenties, I think.
24	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Sorry?
25	[MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: In the twenties, I

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1 quess. 2 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: In the twenties? 3 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Yes. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Do you know how to 4 5 spell that residential school? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I think it starts 6 7 with a C. 8 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: K-O-K? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Huh? 9 10 [MS. JULIA IDA JOSEPH]: Isn't it K-O-K? 11 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Maybe it's K. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: K-O-K? 12 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: A-L. 13 14 MS. MELODY CASELLA: Is that the one in Chilliwack? 15 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah. 16 17 MS. MELODY CASELLA: It's C-O-Q-U-A-L-E-E-T-Z-A, Coqualeetza. 18 [MS. JOLENE JOE]: Would you take a five-19 20 minute break? 21 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: For the record, that's 22 ___ 23 [MS. JOLENE JOE]: (Inaudible) a five-minute 24 break? 25 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Melody Casella

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(phonetic), National Inquiry Health Coordinator. 1 2 Could you spell that one more time? MS. MELODY CASELLA: C-O-Q-U-A-L-E-E-T-Z-A. 3 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Clearly nobody was 4 5 going to spell that right. Thank you, Melody. MS. MELODY CASELLA: My dad has worked up 6 7 there. 8 MS. JOLENE JOE: Can we get a five-minute break please? 9 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Yes, now is an okay 10 11 time. I'll just pause the recordings. --- Upon recessing 12 --- Upon resuming 13 14 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, we're back from a five-minute break. 15 So before the break we were talking about 16 some of the contributors to Violet's situation. And your 17 father was abusive and had an alcohol problem. Violet 18 attended residential school. Your mother attended 19 residential school. 20 Which residential school did Violet attend? 21 22 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Port Alberni. Here. [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: AIRS, Alberni Indian 23 24 Residential School. I guess we all did, eh? Except [C.K.] was in the TB hospital. 25

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1	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. And did any of
2	you ever talk with Violet about her experience during
3	residential school? No?
4	[MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: She was closer to her
5	than me. We were already on our own, me and my older
6	sister.
7	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: All I know is, she
8	was rebellious. She had the nerve to run away. I could
9	never do that. She used to just be with friends and then
10	face the punishment when you come back, when you get
11	caught.
12	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay, and would you
13	expect that your experience in residential school was
14	similar to hers?
15	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: M'hm.
16	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So what types of
17	violence would you have experienced in residential school?
18	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: We experienced
19	severe discipline. Crowded dormitories meant it was easy.
20	At times, if we didn't confess who was caught or was out of
21	bed or was talking, the entire dorm would get spanked on
22	the bare bottom. Or if nobody confessed who stole
23	somebody's silly bag of cookies or something, if you ate
24	the cookies too you got strapped on the hand. I'm just
25	telling you what I recall.

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. 1 2 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I got strapped the very first night I was there because I didn't understand 3 that you weren't supposed to be going to the washroom when 4 the lights were out already. And I was caught jumping back 5 into bed. And I had just what I thought was the ugliest 6 nightie on. Ripped off me and just strap, strap, strap 7 8 about 20 times and I just rolled and rolled and rolled. And how many times, how many people were 9 strapped like that, I don't know. I've seen people 10 11 strapped just because they dumped the sock bag out and made 12 a mess. It was called a mess and they got strapped. Washing stairs down top to bottom for 13 punishment. 14 We witnessed the men fighting in the dining 15 rooms with the male supervisors. We witnessed our -- some 16 of our senior women fighting each other, eh? There were 17 violence against each other. 18 And despite this punishment, my sister had 19 the guts to run away and so did my brother, one of them. 20 21 And we lost that protection. Sometimes men have more 22 respect for you when they know you have your brothers watching over. And we lost all -- we lost four of our 23 brothers, and only the youngest one left. 24 25 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And when you say you

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"lost" your brothers, how did that happen? 1 2 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: They passed away in two drownings because of spousal troubles. A brother, a 3 younger brother was hit on the highway. He was a very 4 radical -- what would you call -- he was ---5 [MS. BETTY KNIGHTON]: He belonged to the 6 7 American Indian Movement. 8 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: American Indian 9 Movement, yeah. So he was always afraid that he was on a hit list of some kind. And that was Larry. 10 11 Who am I missing? Oh, my brother committed suicide; the most senior brother committed suicide with a 12 gun. So yeah. We lost that kind of security of our 13 14 brothers. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So for Violet, was 15 there anything that might have helped her avoid this 16 tragedy in her life? What should have happened, what 17 didn't happen that should have happened? 18 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Someone reporting 19 that that fellow was violent, maybe from his own community 20 21 that she should maybe not be with him. I don't know if I -- if there's a backlash 22 involved with Anne's death [Registrar's note: see Statement 23 24 Volume 178(b)] but my own cousins were acting cold somewhere after the incident. And we were swearing we were 25

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1	going to follow up because there was a video for the
2	(inaudible) [Anne's death]. You could tell by her bruises
3	that they were old. And she had already been in car
4	accidents with this fellow and yet he was still beating
5	her.
6	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And so to return to
7	Violet for a moment, it sounds like she was a strong person
8	
9	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Yeah.
10	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: the way you
11	describe her. What were her strengths and her resiliencies
12	as a person?
13	[MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I think she spoke up
14	when there were injustices. I remember her speaking up to
15	our leadership in Nitinaht. And they were kind of they
16	liked to believe the community, the leadership we had at
17	her time. And talk was in very harsh voices and she wasn't
18	afraid to voice her opinion.
19	MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Just a couple more
20	questions about Violet. Do you have any hope that police -
21	
22	[MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: Just when you're
23	talking about her resilience and what she had to
24	contribute, she was with my mom one time.
25	My mom came my mom was there and she had

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started asking me what had happened. I was raped by my 1 2 neighbour with a knife. And I told my mom and my Auntie Vi was 3 there. And she said, "Betsy, we got to go phone the cops. 4 5 Your daughter was raped. We have to tell them," she said. So then that -- and that day she found there 6 was just radio phones and I don't know where they went. I 7 didn't understand what they were doing or anything. But my 8 Auntie Vi was the one that pulled her out and said, "We 9 have to report this to the cops." 10 11 So for me, that was -- she wanted to protect She wanted to give me justice. And so my bond with 12 me. her got really close. I always wanted to be with her after 13 14 that because she felt like my protector. And there, that's when I started doing 15 things for her too. I wanted to give back to her. I 16 thought I was helping her. I used to babysit for her not 17 realizing that I was only enabling her to go out and drink. 18 So somewhere along the line she knew that 19 what had happened was wrong, illegal, and wanted justice 20 21 done. 22 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: How old were you when this happened? 23 24 [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: About 11. 25 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: In those days the

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police didn't even come either. They'd just sit back. 1 2 [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: They did. [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: Did they? 3 [MS. MAUREEN KNIGHTON]: Not right away but 4 5 they did. MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Before I move on I 6 7 just want to be sure; does anybody else have a story about 8 Violet, about her strength, about her resiliency? [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I always admired how 9 she -- she'd quit school and my fear was that I had to get 10 11 education for security. But she was able to just leave. But then she became good at traditional, like, fish cutting 12 and basket weaving and not all of us can do that. But she 13 14 had that kind of -- she didn't appear to be patient but she did learn a lot of traditional things that I didn't learn 15 16 myself. 17 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Thank you. One last question. Does anybody have any 18 documents in their possession in relation to Violet's 19 20 murder? 21 MS. C.K.: Any documents on what? 22 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Any documents about 23 Violet's murder in terms of reports by police, coroners, 24 hospital records? 25 MS. C.K.: I didn't get anything.

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MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. 1 2 MS. C.K.: Because they didn't report anything. I think that we just heard about it through 3 (inaudible). 4 5 [MS. BERNICE TOUCHIE]: I think all of the documents were sent to the band, to the band office, and a 6 lot of times did not -- they never reached the families 7 because I understood that my father's death certificate was 8 sent there but we never got it. Things like never reached 9 the families. 10 11 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. Before we move on is there anything else anybody would like to say about 12 Violet? Are there any questions that I should have asked 13 14 that I overlooked, or any other information that you want to share about Violet? 15 MS. C.K.: Violet (inaudible) what went on. 16 We were kind of helpless. Those (inaudible) here 17 (inaudible) tell us way after. So we can't even get to 18 find help. 19 MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. As we agreed at 20 the five-minute break, we'll pause now so that everybody 21 22 can have lunch. 23 24 --- Upon adjourning 25
