

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4 MS. KERRIE REAY: So this is Kerrie Reay.

5 I'm a statement taker with the National Inquiry into

6 Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and we are

in Moncton, New Brunswick and the date is October the 20th,

2018 and the time is 3:25 P.M. Today I am speaking with

Lornie Bonnell of the Burnt Church, First Nation and Lornie

resides on the Burnt Church, First Nation reserve.

11 Lornie is here to tell her truth regarding

12 the death of her sister, Geraldine Bonnell who was shot and

her life was taken in the summer of 1974 at Boston,

Massachusetts.

15 Also present in the room is Tiger, and

that's T-I-G-E-R, and Bonnell, and for the record that is B

17 as in Bob, U-N -- B-O?

18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.

19 MS. KERRIE REAY: Sorry. B-O-N as in

Norman, N as in Norman, E-L-L. And I'd also like to spell

21 Lornie's first name. It is L-O-R-N as in Norman, I-E. And

Tiger is Lornie's daughter. And just for the record,

Lornie, you are here voluntarily to provide your truth and

you agree to the videotaping and audio taping ---

MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yes.

(Geraldine Bonnell)

1 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- of your truth? You also understand that at the end of the -- at your -- of 2 3 your statement we'll come back to whether or not you would like the -- how you would like the inquiry to use your ---4 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 5 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- truth today, whether 6 7 it be public or private. So Lornie, when you are comfortable and 8 9 ready, I invite you to start talking. MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Certainly. Okay. 10 Well, we lived here in Burnt Church since long and I was 11 12 cleaning the floor and my aunt came over. She just lived a couple of houses down. And she came over and there was a 13 knock on the door. And I was washing the floor as usual. 14 And when my aunt came in my mom opened the door and she, 15 "Yeah, what's going on?" And my aunt, in Indian, Mi'kmag, 16 said, "Geraldine don't [speaking in Mi'kmag]." That means 17 18 she's dead. And I couldn't understand Indian but when she said that I knew what she said. I don't know why. 19 And now I'll go over what happened. And she 20 21 told her she got shot in a bar. And I was wondering, "What the hell is she doing in a bar where you can get shot? 22 23 People don't get shot in a bar." 24 Anyway, it -- so what happened, Gilly (ph.)

had an argument with her boyfriend. And we heard this from

2

[Person X]. That was her boyfriend's brother. He comes down Burnt Church every summer. And he said that her and [Geraldine's Boyfriend] got into an argument so she walked out of their apartment. And she went to this other bar that they never go to. They either went to this bar or that bar. Never that one. But she went there because she knew [Geraldine's Boyfriend] was going to come look for her so she went to this bar.

And from what the cops told [Geraldine's Boyfriend], she was just going to leave the bar and that's when the back guys busted in and they just blew her away and they shot around the bar at other people. And they shot another guy. He died. And another one but they only got him in the shoulder. And the cops seen him walking down the street bleeding and they told him, "What's going on? What's happened?" And then he told them that there was shooting a Diamond Junes (ph.). That was the name of the bar then. And so the cops went there and they found Geraldine on the floor and that other guy over there by the bar dead. And that's as much as we know.

And she was only 27 years old.

MS. KERRIE REAY: And how old were you at

the time?

MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Twenty-two.

MS. KERRIE REAY: And -- and you were saying

- 1 this was back in 1974?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 2
- 3 MS. KERRIE REAY: And has there been any

4

- record shared with you about what happened ---4
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. 5
- MS. KERRIE REAY: --- or your unanswered 6
- 7 questions ---
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No, that's all he know 8
- 9 what was written on that little piece of paper and what my
- mother told us. That's it. 10
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 11
- 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And what we heard from
- [Person X] because he lived in Boston and he knew what was 13
- 14 going on because of his brother.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And -- and was your 15
- sister brought back to Canada? 16
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm. 17
- 18 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And was there any -
- so are there -- are there unanswered questions, like, do 19
- you know what happened to these ---20
- 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: We want to know --
- well, we used to want to know if she was targeted or it was 22
- 23 just an act of violence. Like, we don't know.
- 24 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. So -- so there are
- 25 lots of unanswered questions?

1	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm. M'hm.
2	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And so so
3	something like the police report, would that be helpful?
4	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, yeah. Oh, yeah.
5	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Now, it being in
6	the States, I'm not really sure what we can and can't get
7	but there's an organization in all of the provinces. It's
8	called the Family Information Liaison Unit, and New
9	Brunswick has one. And they're there to help families get
10	those documents and but I'm not sure what the reach will
11	be on the other side.
12	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Because it's in
13	another country, right?
14	MS. KERRIE REAY: Yes. Yeah. And for the
15	record, that was that was Tiger speaking. And you know,
16	when it is in another country we're not really I'm not
17	really sure what the process is but they will know. The
18	people from FILU will know and they so I'll after
19	we're done I'll get some information from you, some
20	contacts, so that we can get to so that
21	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Okay.
22	MS. KERRIE REAY: so that we can see if
23	there's a way to get some of the that information.
24	Were you told anything about whether they
25	caught the man?

- 1 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Oh, yeah, it's on
- 2 those -- that paper I was going to bring.
- 3 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 4 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: They did catch them
- 5 but they didn't give us any answers to why they picked that
- 6 bar and why they shot who they shot. We don't know.
- 7 MS. KERRIE REAY: And are you aware of the
- 8 prosecution and what happened in the States?
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
- 10 MS. KERRIE REAY: Were they convicted or ---
- 11 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. We don't know
- nothing after that.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Wow, that's a long
- 14 time to not have any answers.
- 15 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I know.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Holy. Yeah. Okay. Well,
- we'll -- we'll certainly put you in touch to help see if we
- 18 can get some of those answers for you. Okay. One of the -
- 19 one of the things is would you like to share with the
- 20 Commissioners how that traumatic and horrible loss of your
- 21 sister has affected you and your family? And did she have
- children or ---
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah, she did have --
- her son just died a month ago maybe.
- MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: In August.

1 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Five weeks ago. 2 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: August 14. 3 MS. KERRIE REAY: Wow. MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Yeah. 4 5 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Her son, she had one son living on the reserve. The -- he -- she had a daughter 6 7 in Boston but she gave that up right from the hospital so we don't' know her, we don't know anything. 8 9 MS. KERRIE REAY: So she was living in Boston ---10 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 11 12 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- then for a while? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. All her life 13 practically. After she left Burnt Church she lived there 14 the rest of her life. 15 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And how -- how did 16 -- can you share how that loss impacted your mom and -- and 17 18 your family? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Well, my mom was a 19 tough woman. Like, I really don't know. I couldn't see 20 21 how it hurt her. Because me, I lived -- for a week after she got shot I lived in a daze. You know, all I did was 22 23 clean house, [inaudible response] my mom [inaudible response]. And she said, "Lornie, stop. You have no right 24

to feel that hard. Like, we can't bring her back." So

- 1 that did wake me up a bit and I was okay after that. And
- she said, "You got kids to take care of. Take care of
- 3 them." My daughter.
- 4 MS. KERRIE REAY: So grieving, do you feel -
- 5 do you feel that you're still grieving?
- 6 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, when I talk about
- 7 her, yeah.
- 8 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Yeah.
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But I don't talk about
- her much. It's not too often.
- 11 MS. KERRIE REAY: And it -- and I mean, it's
- been a long time.
- 13 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: It's -- it's in here.
- 14 MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah. Yeah. And so
- talking today, that -- that trauma is -- is coming back.
- 16 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Brings it back.
- 17 MS. KERRIE REAY: It's coming back.
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But once we're back on
- 19 the road it'll be gone because I don't make it a -- to
- think about it too badly.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And -- and her son -- so -
- 22 so you were saying that she had a daughter that she gave
- up for adoption?
- 24 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: From the hospital,
- yeah.

1	MS. KERRIE REAY: And that was in in
2	Massachusetts?
3	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yes.
4	MS. KERRIE REAY: So there's a niece
5	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: A son she had in Burnt
6	Church and she gave him to my aunt.
7	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
8	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And he was
9	MS. KERRIE REAY: That'd be her
10	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
11	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Yeah.
12	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Personal Information]
13	That's why she gave her [Geraldine's Son]. And he was 51 I
14	think. Yeah.
15	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Fifty-one? Fifty.
16	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
17	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: He he would have
18	been 51 this
19	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, okay.
20	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: November.
21	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: He was the same age.
22	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Yeah.
23	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And how did and
24	and how did he pass away?
25	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: How did he

- 1 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Liver failure. 2 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 3 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I thought it was drowning? He fell in the water. 4 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Officially. 5 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 6 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: It's a liver failure. 7 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And he almost drowned 8 9 to death but they pulled him out of the water, took him to the hospital, they revived him. He was in a coma for a 10 week. He finally woke up, talked a little bit. Well, 11 mumbled. He couldn't talk. And then he went back in and 12 the doctors said his liver gave. He drank a lot. And he 13 14 died two days later. Something like that. MS. KERRIE REAY: How old was he when his 15 mom passed away? 16 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Holy, he was only ---17 18 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Six, seven. MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah, six or seven, 19 yeah. He was young when she died. He didn't know her that 20 21 well either though.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Because she was in
- 24 Boston. He was home. But when she'd come down every
- summer to visit she would have a day with him.

25

1 MS. KERRIE REAY: And -- and did he ever talk about his feelings about ---2 3 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. MS. KERRIE REAY: --- being raised by an 4 5 aunt ---MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, no. She gave him 6 the best life. Yeah. She -- he was okay there. 7 MS. KERRIE REAY: And -- and did he share 8 9 about how he felt about not having his mom around? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. 10 MS. KERRIE REAY: His natural mom? 11 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No, he never shared that with me. And when my -- when my sister died she had a 13 ring and it said, "Love." And my mom went to Boston with 14 my sister and she took her belongings. And when she came 15 home she said, "Lornie, here, you keep this. This was 16 Geraldine's ring." So I kept it. And when I -- and she 17 showed it to me there was even blood still on it. And I 18 kept that ring for the longest time. But when she became 19 of age I told Tiger, "You wear this ring. This was 20 21 Geraldine's." And she wore it. She even wore it out. She wore it right out. It broke. She's supposed to get that 22 23 fixed. Anyway ---24 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: We still have it.

MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.

- 1 MS. KERRIE REAY: That's nice.
- 2 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: She's going to get it
- fixed. But that was like having a piece of her.
- 4 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: And I gave it to
- 5 [Geraldine's Son].
- 6 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, and she gave it to
- 7 [Geraldine's Son] because that was her (sic.) mom.
- 8 [Geraldine's Son], how long did he keep it? About month?
- 9 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: Yeah.
- 10 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Anyway, he brought it
- 11 back and he told Tiger, "No, you keep this. I'll lose it."
- Because he drank too much. So Tiger kept it.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: So -- so her son,
- 14 [Geraldine's Son]?
- MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: M'hm.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: [Geraldine's Son] had some
- 17 challenges, some struggles growing up?
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Would you like to share
- those with the Commission?
- 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I wouldn't know them.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 23 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But I know he had
- troubles because he drank too much, like, to be straight.
- Like, if he didn't have trouble he wouldn't have drank that

- 1 much. I think.
- 2 MS. KERRIE REAY: Right. Right. And do you
- 3 have other siblings as well?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Me? Yes. 4
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And how have they coped? 5
- How many siblings do you have? 6
- 7 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: They were all okay.
- They're just like me I think. Same feelings. Whenever 8
- 9 Geraldine's name came up you could see a little light go
- off, or whatever. 10
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Is there anything else 11
- 12 that you would like to share? You've come -- you've come a
- -- a distance. You've travelled for two hours. Some of 13
- the examples of things that the Commission and the Inquiry 14
- is looking at and the Commissioners are -- are interested 15
- in is the impacts of that inter-generational violence. And 16
- -- and I ask because you -- you talk about Tim's use of --17
- 18 of substances and -- and the challenges. And one of the
- things that we see through the loss of a parent through 19
- experiences going to residential school or children who 20
- 21 were taken during the 60s, and even today, you know, we're
- still seeing that ongoing -- the child welfare system 22
- 23 taking children ---
- 24 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
- 25 MS. KERRIE REAY: [Rule 55].

1	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm.
2	MS. KERRIE REAY: And
3	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
4	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Okay. And and
5	where and what residential school did you
6	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Shubenacadie.
7	MS. KERRIE REAY: And was that far from
8	Burnt Church?
9	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Nova Scotia.
10	MS. KERRIE REAY: So that was quite a
11	distance.
12	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm.
13	MS. KERRIE REAY: How old were you when they
14	
15	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh my God, I think I
16	was five.
17	MS. KERRIE REAY: So very young.
18	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Really young.
19	MS. KERRIE REAY: Very young.
20	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
21	MS. KERRIE REAY: And and how long did
22	you go to school?
23	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I thought it was four
24	or five years but when we got that thing from them they
25	said we were only there three years, so I don't know. My

1	mom always told us we were there five years. And we
2	weren't allowed to come home on the summer time. Too far
3	for them I guess. And they would put us in another
4	reserve, another person's house that would take care of us.
5	MS. KERRIE REAY: Would you like to share
6	any of those experiences with the
7	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't remember them.
8	I don't the only time I remembered was when we had
9	chicken pox. That's the only thing I remember, having
10	chicken pox living in another reserve in Nova Scotia. But
11	other than that, I don't remember where else we were sent.
12	MS. KERRIE REAY: No?
13	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
14	MS. KERRIE REAY: [Rule 55].
15	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
16	MS. KERRIE REAY: [Rule 55].
17	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
18	MS. KERRIE REAY: That's okay.
19	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
20	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
21	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: [Rule 55].
22	MS. KERRIE REAY: Oh dear.
23	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
24	MS. KERRIE REAY: And so you were about
25	eight or nine, maybe ten when you came home?

- 1 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: When we got home, yeah.
- 2 MS. KERRIE REAY: And -- and you came back
- 3 to ---
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Burnt Church. 4
- 5 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- Burnt Church?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 6
- 7 MS. KERRIE REAY: And your parents were
- there? 8
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Well, my mom. My dad
- lived in Sussex. They broke up or whatever you call it. 10
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. And coming back to 11
- 12 your own reserve, how was that for you?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Different. 13
- 14 MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: It was, like, 15
- different. 16
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Can you describe how that 17
- 18 was for you coming back after being gone for all those
- 19 years?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Well, I -- that's how 20
- 21 it was like. Because in Shubie (ph.) we weren't allowed to
- do anything. 22
- 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: No.
- 24 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Anything. If you got
- caught talking in Indian they would put soap in your mouth, 25

- 1 stand you in the corner and you couldn't get out of that
- 2 corner until that soap was gone. Yeah, it was a bad place.
- 3 MS. KERRIE REAY: And coming home, how was
- your mom? How was your mom doing when you ---4
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Well, she was glad. 5
- She was glad we come home. 6
- 7 MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah. And how did she
- 8 cope when you were gone?
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't know.
- [Personal Information] 10
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Did she? 11
- 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Take the pain away. 13
- 14 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't know. But
- probably. 15
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And then you grew up on 16
- the reserve? 17
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah. And how was growing 19
- 20 up?
- 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Pretty good.
- 22 MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah.
- 23 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And ---
- 24 MS. KERRIE REAY: Would you like to share --
- 25

1 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: --- when I started 2 having my kids, in my mind, I said, "Well, we went through 3 Shubenacadie. My kids ain't going to know nothing about it." And I hardly ever talk about Shubie. And I brought 4 my kids up pretty good. I am proud of myself. 5 MS. KERRIE REAY: Good. And so how many 6 7 children do you have? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Five. 8 9 MS. KERRIE REAY: Five. I know one's a girl because Tiger -- Tiger is here with you. 10 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But my youngest one --11 12 my youngest one, [Daughter], she's the girl too. MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 13 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Three boys in the 14 middle. 15 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. So Tiger is your 16 oldest. 17 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm. MS. KERRIE REAY: And how -- things are good 19 for you now? 20 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. Yeah. 22 MS. KERRIE REAY: Good. Was there anything

else that you would like to share? Any insights of what

child welfare or policing? These are all areas that the

it's like in terms of what you see on the reserve with

- 1 Commission -- Commissioners are interested in.
- 2 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Well, to me, the child
- 3 welfare ain't so good.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: No? 4
- 5 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Because a lot of shit
- goes on and nothing happens. You don't see the kids in a 6
- 7 better place when they do take them away.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Has your family been 8
- 9 impacted at all by child welfare?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: 10
- MS. KERRIE REAY: So you're -- you're seeing 11
- 12 what's happening with the other families?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. Yeah. 13
- 14 MS. KERRIE REAY: And are you finding that
- the child welfare is -- is still taking children from your 15
- 16 reserve?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. No, they're not. 17
- 18 MS. KERRIE REAY: They're not.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. Not when they 19
- don't have to. When it's a necessity you can see it that 20
- 21 they did have the right to do that because the parents were
- really bad. 22
- 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 24 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
- 25 MS. KERRIE REAY: All right. And what about

- 1 policing? Have you had any experiences with whether the
- 2 police ---
- 3 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No, I think they're
- 4 okay.
- 5 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. I think the cops 6
- 7 are okay.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Is there anything 8
- 9 else that you would like to share?
- 10 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No, I don't think so.
- And if I did have something else, I forget so easy. 11
- 12 MS. KERRIE REAY: Do you?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Honest to God, yeah. 13
- It's like ---14
- 15 MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: She had a stroke ---
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I had a stroke ---16
- MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: --- years ago. 17
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. All my memory
- ain't that good anymore. 19
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And so when -- but do you 20
- 21 recall when you had your stroke?
- 22 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Three years ago.
- 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: Three years ago. So about
- 24 2015?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: M'hm. 25

1	MS. KERRIE REAY: And were you taken were
2	you in one of the local hospitals? Like, in
3	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
4	MS. KERRIE REAY: Fredericton, Moncton -
5	
6	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Newcastle.
7	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: New Merishi (ph.).
8	MS. KERRIE REAY: In
9	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: New Merishi.
10	MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
11	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Used to be Newcastle.
12	MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: It was Newcastle
13	before they amalgamated.
14	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay. Okay.
15	MS. KERRIE REAY: And and how how was
16	your care there? Was it
17	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Good.
18	MS. KERRIE REAY: Good.
19	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: It was good.
20	MS. KERRIE REAY: Good.
21	MS. LORNIE BONNELL: They didn't want me to
22	leave.
23	MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah. Well, because
24	that's part of the those systems, government systems,
25	our our justice system, our medical system, our child

- 1 welfare system. And the Commissioners are interested in
- people's experiences in terms of how they've been treated
- 3 as an Indigenous person within ---
- 4 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay.
- 5 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- those systems.
- 6 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, no, they treated me
- 7 real good in the hospital.
- 8 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Really good, yeah.
- 10 MS. KERRIE REAY: Have you ---
- 11 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And I had no problems
- with cops. I even was speeding from here going home once
- and a cop was behind me and he flashed his lights for me to
- 14 slow down. I didn't see him. I'm so busy -- you know,
- when you're on the car and you're singing and enjoying the
- 16 ride, and he went right beside me and he beeped and I went,
- 17 "Oh." So I pulled over and he said, "You know how fast you
- were going?" And I, "No." And he said, "Well, I'm telling
- 19 you you were going very fast. Could you slow down?" And
- he said, "I'm not going to ticket you or anything. And he
- 21 said, "Let your reserve know that I'm a good guy."
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I said okay and he let
- me go. But I slowed down.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. So -- so in terms

- 1 of the impact of the -- sort of those institutional
- 2 experiences, yours have been -- have been fairly good?
- 3 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And having your children 4
- in the hospital or did you have them at home? 5
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I've never had any 6
- 7 complaints about them being in a hospital.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 8
- 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Have you sensed any 10
- of the racism that they speak so much of? 11
- 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. I never. No.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 13
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't -- white men 14
- never treated me funny. 15
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Other than the residential 16
- school, right? 17
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Right, right. But that's 19
- still front and center. 20
- 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And do you know that
- when we were in Shubie, I never knew this, but my lawyer, 22
- 23 they -- my lawyer was told that in Shubie when the nuns and
- priests and brothers wanted the job to work in Shubenacadie 24
- Residential School, the first question was how do you feel 25

- 1 about us Indian kids. And the ones that liked us, they
- 2 weren't hired. They only hired the ones that didn't give a
- 3 shit about us. I don't know how they said that because
- they're priests and nuns. 4
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Right. 5
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But -- yeah. And I 6
- 7 couldn't believe it. And the priest, the one that sexually
- abused a lot of kids there, they knew he was a sexual 8
- 9 predator yet they let him be our priest.
- 10 MS. KERRIE REAY: And was -- was he ever
- charged because over time ---11
- 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
- 13 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 14 MS. LORNIE BONNELL:
- 15 MS. KERRIE REAY: Is he still alive?
- 16 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No.
- MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: No. 17
- 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: He died long time.
- 19 Twenty years ago maybe.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 20
- 21 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Because he must have
- been pretty old by now. 22
- 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay.
- 24 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: So justice was never 25

- 1 served?
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. I even told that 2
- 3 to my lawyer. I said, "Honest to God", I said, "If they
- were alive today I swear to God I would kill them. I" --4
- and he said, "Lornie, they're going to have their pay. 5
- Remember who's in charge here." And he pointed up and 6
- 7 you're right. Yeah.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And so have you had an --8
- 9 so in terms of your own healing, have you -- do you use
- traditional ---10
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. 11
- MS. KERRIE REAY: --- or cultural ---12
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't believe in that 13
- 14 fanning the smoke and all that. No.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 15
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. 16
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And given your -- your 17
- 18 upbringing in that -- that short -- well, it probably felt
- like forever; those years that you were with the church ---19
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Shubenacadie. That's 20
- 21 where we're taught going to church, God, Jesus [inaudible
- response] say so. And I believe in God. 22
- 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: Yeah.
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I would never go back. 24
- It's -- it's in me. 25

MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Okay. And you said 1 2 something there that just sort of triggered a question for 3 me. Usually I write it down. But you know when you're listening you probably don't -- you don't want to -- to 4 break that -- that, you know, when you're listening. Okay. 5 It's gone. 6 7 So while I'm still thinking, we will -- I'm just -- I'm just going to sort of remind that we will 8 9 connect because there's still a lot of unanswered questions for yourself. 10 And I -- I know what I was going to ask you. 11 12 Do you speak your language? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. 13 MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. Because you made 14 reference to a couple of words there so I was just 15 wondering if you ---16 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Oh, no, I -- I will 17 18 always remember those words. I didn't know what they meant but I knew what she meant when I heard them. I knew she 19 said Geraldine's dead. I didn't know why or how but... 20 21 MS. KERRIE REAY: Did your mom speak your language? 22 23 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yes. 24 MS. KERRIE REAY: So your time away ---25 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: And my father.

- 1 MS. KERRIE REAY: And your father. So your 2 time away at the residential school, you lost the ability 3 to speak your language? MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. 4 MS. KERRIE REAY: No? 5 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. My mom and dad 6 7 never taught us Indian. MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: I always blamed her. 8 9 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Yeah. No, my ---MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: I always blamed her -10 11 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: --- father ---MS. PEARLENE BONNELL: --- that we couldn't' 13 speak Mi'kmaq and I always thought it was her fault because 14 she never told us about Shubenacadie until we were a lot 15 16 older. MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But no, I never could 17 18 speak it anyway. MS. KERRIE REAY: Okay. 19 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: But we weren't allowed 20 21 to speak it in Shubenacadie. And I saw a lot of kids 22 getting in trouble for that. 23 MS. KERRIE REAY: Right.
- think they were alone and they'd be talking in Indian but 25

MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Because they would

24

- 1 they'd always get caught. Maybe some got away with it. I 2 don't know. But a lot got caught. 3 MS. KERRIE REAY: Do you know, did your mom go to residential school? 4 5 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. No, she didn't. MS. KERRIE REAY: And what about your dad? 6 7 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. MS. KERRIE REAY: Because I -- I'm -- you 8 9 know, given what Tiger commented about that thinking that it was your choice to not carry on -- on -- on the language 10 because we've -- you know, we understand that for many 11 12 families across this country parents learned when they were in residential school not to speak their language and so 13 then they chose not to ---14 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay. 15 MS. KERRIE REAY: --- teach their children -16 17 18 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Just in case.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: --- because they were --19 they were concerned, right. They didn't -- they -- they 20 21 didn't want it to continue. They didn't want that violence against their children for speaking that language. 22
- 23 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: And so I -- I'm just -- I 24 was just interested in terms for -- for -- for your truth 25

1 as to whether or not that that might have been part of it

- in terms of ---2
- 3 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Do you know how your 4
- mother and dad did not end up in residential school? 5
- MS. LORNIE BONNELL: No. And that wouldn't 6
- 7 be a question because why would anybody ask that?
- MS. KERRIE REAY: Because I -- I do know 8
- 9 that families hid children so that -- that they -- they
- couldn't be taken. And so I'm just wondering in terms of 10
- your own ---11
- 12 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: Okay.
- MS. KERRIE REAY: --- family history if 13
- there -- there had been events back a ways, generations, so 14
- that children weren't taken. Okay. And -- and the reason 15
- I ask about language is because often I do invite people, 16
- if they'd like to share a few words in their language, 17
- 18 because it was taken from them and that this is an
- opportunity here to -- to speak it, so, okay. Is anything 19
- else that you might like to share? Would you -- would you 20
- 21 like us to stop for a minute because -- to see whether or
- not there might be other thoughts or ---22
- 23 MS. LORNIE BONNELL: I don't think there's
- anything else. 24
