

1 Membertou, Nova Scotia --- Upon commencing on Monday, October 30, 2017 at 12:45 2 3 p.m. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: So I will have the video 4 recorder and the audio recorder on. So again I'll repeat 5 that my name is Debbie Bodkin, and I'm a statement taker 6 7 with the Commission. And my job here today is to help you bring forward whatever your truth is, whatever your story 8 9 is, in whatever manner's comfortable for you. 10 The date is Monday, October 30, and I have it's 12:45. And we're in Membertou, Nova Scotia. And, are 11 you comfortable introducing yourself? (indiscernible) 12 [Giving] your full name? 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 14 My name is Shirley Christmas. My maiden name is Paul. 15 16 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. And where are you from, Shirley? 17 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Membertou. 18 19 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Membertou. Okay. And we also have present -- sorry, Jackie, if you'd give your 20 full name? 21 22 MS. JACKLYN PAUL: My name is Jacklyn Paul 23 (ph) and I'm from Sipekne'katik First Nation here and help 24 [as a health] support. 25 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Wonderful. Wonderful.

1 So our cell phones are off. We got the recording's on. If 2 you see me take any notes, it's only to remind myself of questions that we might go through. And I'm not taking 3 notes of your interview, it's just to keep myself on track. 4 5 So again, I'll repeat that everything that's recorded, and audio taped goes to the Commission, it stays 6 7 with them there. So this -- consider -- please consider this a safe place, a comfortable place. If you need a 8 9 break, you know, if we go on for quite a time and you need 10 a break, just let me know. There's no problem with that. So basically, you're in charge here. And I'll just help 11 you out as best I can as we grow[go] through. 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I remember hearing 13 14 those words before. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh, okay. Well 15 16 hopefully I'm saying them and there will be a good outcome in the end with your statement. 17 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, the other one 18 19 was a good outcome. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh, okay. 21 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: It's just --22 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Good to know. 23 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: So any other questions 24 25 before you kind of launch in? So wherever you want to

1 begin -- you've got your coffee. If you need water, let me 2 know. We have --MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yes. 3 4 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: -- Kleenex here. We also have a bag here for Kleenex if --5 6 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: No. I guess I want to start with my younger sister. 7 8 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okav. 9 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Her name was Emma. 10 Emma Ann Paul. And that day -- and she was just 24. She was a mother of three, and she lived across from me. 11 Well, she did for a while. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Here in Membertou, you 13 14 said? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. And we got 15 16 along very well. And you know, we -- we like sort of supported each other of whatever dreams or goals we had. 17 And she always called me Sho-Sho (ph). I don't know where 18 19 she got that name from, but that's what she called me, Sho-Sho. Anyway, she -- I don't know, I can't remember exactly 20 21 days or months or things like that, but she no longer lived 22 across the street from me anymore. She -- she gave her children to her -- to the children's father. She met this 23 other dude. And I quess she didn't want children or 24 25 things, I don't know what it was, but anyway, she -- the

1	father took the children.
2	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And how many children?
3	MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Huh?
4	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: How many children?
5	MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Three.
6	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Three?
7	MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. And she moved
8	in with this guy, [Boyfriend]. It's okay to say the name
9	is it?
10	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Absolutely, yeah.
11	MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: [Boyfriend] I
12	guess they were together for a while. I don't really know
13	because I lost touch with her. I only see her every now
14	and then. And a couple days before before
15	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: You have all the time
16	you want so don't rush yourself.
17	MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Couple of days
18	before they found her body, she came to this
19	(indiscernible) [visit me]. Just to (indiscernible) I
20	guess. And she had a scarf on her neck. And this was in
21	the summer, quite warm. And I I'm not one for asking
22	questions, you know? But I'm one for observing and I
23	noticed that on her neck well, at first, I thought they
24	were hickies, but they weren't. They were marks like,
25	bruises. I didn't question her and and we talked for a

while and -- and I asked her, I said, "Are you okay?" She 1 says, "Yeah." I said, "You guys get along all right?" She 2 was quiet for a minute, and then she said, "Yeah." I said, 3 "Are you sure?" Says, "Yeah." She said, "Don't worry." 4 5 Says that she was planning to leave him, you know? And that she found someone else who really care -- cared for 6 her. And I said, "All right." And that was the last time 7 I saw my sister alive when she left home. When she left my 8 9 place.

It wasn't until a couple of days later when 10 they found that [her and] she was murdered and left in the 11 12 back out -- she was strangled. And -- and the guy, he was no where's to be seen or you know, couldn't find him. And 13 he -- I was angry with myself. I felt guilt for a really 14 long time. Because I should have said something. I don't 15 16 know what we [if it] would have done anyway, you know? But maybe if I had said something, maybe she'd be still with 17 us. I don't know. 18

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I feel like I failed
her as a big sister. And I don't think I ever forgave
myself that. I still think about it. Especially when I
see her. She looked (indiscernible) [children]. I don't
know why I can't forgive myself. I don't talk to anyone.
I don't even talk to my mom about it. I don't talk to any

of my sisters. I don't talk to my kids. I don't talk to anyone. I just keep it in. Maybe 'cause I'm afraid that you know, they'll say, "Well, you should have said something," sort of thing. You know, you're -- you're the older sister, you're supposed to do this. Supposed to doing that.

But the thing is, I don't usually -- how do 7 Interfere with other people's relationships. 8 vou put it? 9 And even with my own trauma back then, I didn't discuss it with anyone either, you know? Because I always believed in 10 privacy, you know? What goes on in your own home goes on 11 in your home. Nobody else should know about -- sort of 12 thing. And -- but I still kicked myself in the ass for 13 that, because I didn't say anything, and I should have. 14 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: It'd be difficult 15

16 carrying all that guilt.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Now, with my
granddaughters who are grown, and so far, two of them are
with abusive partners. Well, one left hers, but the other
one, she keeps going back. And it's hard for a grandmother
to see.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.
MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And you could talk
to them, you know? Because I didn't want to make the same
mistake I did with my sister. So I talked to them. One

1 finally caught on so she's out of the relationship. Her 2 and her daughter are -- well, she's now into another relationship. But the [other] one, she keeps going back. 3 You know, and I keep telling her, "He's not going to get 4 5 any better." I said, "Each time it happens it's going to get worse." "No, no granny. He'll be -- he's just tired. 6 He was working." And I said, "There's no excuse. If a man 7 truly loved his girlfriend or wife or whatever, he would 8 9 not raise a hand on her."

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, let alone 11 his own voice, you know? So I -- I told her about her 12 grandfather and the life I had with him. I told her a few 13 things, I wouldn't tell her everything, just a few things. 14 And I told her that it took me years, but I finally -- I 15 said, "After one certain incident," I said, "I had enough. 16 When he started attacking my children," I said, "your 17 father and your uncles," I said, "that was it." So I 18 19 couldn't -- I would stay and take the abuse. But when it came to my children, I said, "No. That was enough." 20 And that was only just a minor one, you 21 know? When I think about it, if I had've (sic) stayed I 22

23 think I would have been with my sister.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I would have been

1 killed. You know, I think about that a lot. And I feel 2 grateful that I had enough courage to walk out. Although, I could still hear my mom in the background that you're 3 married for life and you should stick it out and all this, 4 you know? But I didn't care anymore. I just didn't. 5 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 6 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: When it came to the 7 safety of my children, I had to do something. Yeah. It's 8 9 hard to talk to my mom about things, 'cause my mom is very 10 old-fashioned. And it took her a while to speak to me after I filed for a divorce. You know, it took couple of 11 years, but now we're close. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's good. 13 14 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, took -well, we didn't get close right away. It's just the past, 15 16 I don't know, past six, seven years I guess, my mother and I are close. 17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's good. 18 19 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I spent a lot of 20 time with her. You know, and she's always talking about her childhood and you know, she had such a different 21 22 childhood than I did. 23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And tell me about that. What was hers like? 24 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Her childhood was 25

1 more -- childhood more happier and more like a child should 2 be. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 3 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I didn't have that. 4 There's so much in my life that went on, there's so much 5 pain in my life. I don't remember my childhood because of 6 most of my childhood I was in residential school. That's 7 why I always say I don't have a childhood. 8 9 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I -- and I -- and 10 when I hear my mom's I always feel it's me. It's my 11 childhood, you know? I -- and I love listening to her 12 stories. And I know I'll never get that. 13 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 14 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I know I'll never 15 16 get that back. Maybe that's why today I -- I'm a child at heart. I love Halloween. I never had Halloween. The first 17 Halloween in my memory was when I was 12, 11 or 12, and I 18 19 was no longer in the residential school. But that was my first Halloween in Membertou. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Can you tell me a little 21 22 bit as our time frame when you were in the residential school and when you weren't? 23 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 24 Huh? 25 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: The -- the years, can

you tell me a little bit of a timeline like, when were you 1 2 taken into residential school? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: When I was five. 3 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Five? And whereabouts 4 was it? Which school? Which school? Whereabouts was it? 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: In Shubenacadie. 6 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. And then when you were 12 you were allowed to go back home? 8 9 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, when I was 11, 10 I -- I quess they closed the school down and I was home. And that was my first Halloween. And that's why I love 11 12 Halloween. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I decorate my house 14 to the fullest. 15 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: I love Halloween too. 16 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And when my children 17 were growing up, I always made sure that they had 18 19 Halloween, they had -- that they were happy. That they had a childhood. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Even though my ex-23 husband now was an abusive person, but I had my children. And I think that's what kept me going. 24 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. Providing them a 25

Statement - Public Shirley Christmas (Emma Ann Paul) 1 childhood you missed out on. 2 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I wanted them to have a childhood. 3 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. 4 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? Including Christmas. Christmas --6 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- is another time 8 9 when I become another child. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. That's wonderful. 10 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, you just 12 feel so --MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Feel the love and --13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. The Christmas 14 part I got from my mom, because my mom was the same way 15 16 with us. She always wanted to make sure that we had a good 17 Christmas. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 18 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Like, joy, you know? 19 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 20 21 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And so I just passed 22 that on to my kids. My kids are the same way with their 23 own. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Wonderful. 24 25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? And I

still celebrate Halloween, I still celebrate Christmas. 1 2 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? With a 3 4 difference nowadays --5 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- this would be --6 7 I think this Christmas is the fifth -- it will be -- I have a -- an annual dinner for -- for the regional police in in 8 9 Membertou. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh really? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And this would be my 11 fifth year. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Of hosting this dinner? 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And I have a 14 Christmas dinner for them. They come over you know, and 15 16 it's -- I call it appreciation dinner. 17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's wonderful. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, that's me. 18 19 I -- I like to -- I'm a giver, and I like to see people 20 happy. Maybe because, I don't know, I, I always say I was 21 never a happy person when I was growing up. It was always 22 something that always took me down and -- and -- but as -but as I got older I just realized that you know, I had to 23 think about me. 24 25

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah.

1 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I always wondered why people say, "You got to think about yourself." And I 2 felt so selfish --3 4 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- when somebody used to tell me that. You know, "Think about yourself." 6 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And you're saying 8 9 here, "Why in the name of God would you want to think about 10 yourself?" You know, and I see -- and -- but today, I understand what they mean. 11 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And what's that hounding 12 [how do] you? 13 14 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I guess that's the real me, you know? When you're -- well, I always felt that 15 16 I had something to give to others. But I could never show it. I had a difficult time showing you know, I was just 17 since I started talking about my childhood, the residential 18 19 school that I started realizing who I am, you know? What 20 makes me tick. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: It's just too bad the rest of them [the world] can't see it. 23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. And did you -- do 24 25 you have siblings that also went to residential school as

1 well?

2 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. I protected them as much as I could. The girls anyway, because my 3 brother was on the other side, and I hadn't seen him. 4 5 You're not allowed. And he was -- we are very close today, my brother and I. 6 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. And your sisters 8 as well, are you very close with them too? 9 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Not really. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: You're not as close? 10 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 11 No. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And how many sisters? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: There were 11 13 14 sisters. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 11. 15 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Five passed away. 16 17 They were all younger than me. And I still have two brothers, so I've got, I think, five sisters left. Or four 18 sisters. You know, four sisters. I have four sisters 19 20 left. I got married when I was 23. Yeah. (Indiscernible) to [Ex-Husband]. And we had three sons. I had two 21 22 children before [I met him] and -- before (indiscernible). 23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Of course, most 24 25 [those] relationships are like one-night stand [things]

1 (indiscernible). That was -- that was my life. Like I 2 said, I -- my whole life I think was not good. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: So you had five -- five 3 children of your own, right? Is that what you said? 4 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, I adopted my 6 youngest daughter. 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh, okay. 8 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. She was my 9 sister's daughter. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But my sister asked if I could take her because she was an alcoholic. And she 12 said, she can't. And she didn't want Children Service to 13 take her. [Back then it was] That maybe wasn't sitting 14 well for the (indiscernible) Children Service in Sydney, 15 16 you know? 17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: The ruthless ones 18 19 you know? And so I agreed to take her (indiscernible) and that was, I was still married to --20 21 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- to [Ex-Husband], 23 you know? 24 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And we owned the

1 store and things like that. We were (indiscernible) [but 2 he was still an abusive man] was drinking. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And do you know where 3 that came from? This -- was his childhood [and so on] 4 (indiscernible) where that abusiveness came from in him as 5 -- as his childhood or anything or? 6 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: No. His parents got 7 along very well. You know, I don't know where he got it 8 9 from. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Was he in residential 10 school do you think, himself? 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I don't know. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh, no? Okay. 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: He wasn't abusive 14 when we first started dating. It wasn't until after we got 15 16 married. And I already had one son from him. And when we got married and my other two were born after, I remember 17 when my youngest son, [Son 1] was just let's see. He was 18 born in January. January, February, he was just three 19 months old. And we were living at my -- my great-uncle's 20 place. We didn't have a house. He was building the house. 21 It took him three years. He still never finished it. 22 23 But anyway, I was living with my uncle, my great-uncle and one night he -- my mother-in-law called me 24 25 and she says, "Get out of the house." She said, "[Ex-

Husband] is coming over and he's got a lightbulb." And I 1 2 did not have time to dress my children or dress myself. And it was a winter storm. 3 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 4 M'hm. 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I went out in the back door, took my babies with me. None of us had shoes 6 7 on. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 8 9 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: None of us had coats 10 on. And I went behind in the woods. I had nowhere to go. And he was there hollering, and you know, you could hear 11 So I went around the back of the woods, all the way him. 12 to my in-law's and I got there, and then we tried to call 13 the police and -- and the police wouldn't come up because 14 it was a Mountie jurisdiction or something. And then I 15 called the Mounties. They said they can't come up because 16 it was city. So I called back the city and -- and they --17 I don't know what they said. 18 19 Anyway, I -- I was at my mothers-in-law's

20 and we were talking. And then my ex-husband came over to 21 the house and my father-in-law told him, you know, got mad 22 at him and started hollering at him in Mi'kmaq. Telling 23 him to settle down and all that stuff. And -- and so my 24 father-in-law told me -- and told me to go home, back home 25 to the house. So I did.

1 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Do you remember what 2 year this was around about? Just in --MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: huh? 3 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Do you remember what 4 year this was around about? Like, how old your little ones 5 were and --6 7 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Let's see. [Son 1] was born in '77. January. 8 9 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And it was that year 10 just you said he was just little? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. 11 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. And so I did, 13 I went back to the house. And I figured he -- they -- they 14 keep him over at his place, but he came back to the house. 15 16 And -- and then the cops came in. And they were friendly with my ex. They knew him like a book, and they knew him 17 better than I did, I guess. 18 19 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I don't know. But 20 they told him to settle down, and they took the rifle. 21 22 And --23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And was this the city 24 cops or the RCMP? 25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: The city. So he

1 settled down. And he was quiet for a couple months. And 2 then we moved into the house on Maillard Street. And that's where he started a business, having a store. 3 And -- and it was then that we -- well, I don't know how to 4 5 put this. We were married. But I never seen him. He would come home after we're all in bed. The kids were good 6 night, when [were in bed and] I go to bed. And the only 7 time we see him is in the morning. Well, the kids. Well, 8 9 I -- the kids don't see him. I see him. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 'Cause he's asleep. And then I get up with the kids, get them ready and send 12 them off to school and stuff like that. And when they get 13 home at dinner time, he's not around, you know? This went 14 on for years. And every time he got drunk and if somebody 15 16 got mad at him in town, he comes home and well, I'm the punching bag. 17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 18 19 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? Like I said, we had a store. And I had to look after the store 20 21 'cause it was open -- he would have that store open at 8 in 22 the morning. And I had to get my kids ready for school and 23 things like that. So that was fine. He had an obsession with money. There was a certain way the money had to be 24 when you put it away at nights. You had to have all the 25

money accounted for. The bills had to be like brand new.
 No wrinkles. The corners -- there were not supposed to be
 corners. You had to, you know, make sure there were no
 corners.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.
MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So I did all that.
Then I started getting tired because I, you know, my days
are long. And with four kids it was not easy. And I had
no one to, you know, to go to. I didn't have friends. You
know, no special friends. No --

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: You didn't have time.
You were so busy.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: No. So there was 13 one night I -- I just said, "No." I said, "I had -- I 14 can't do anymore," you know? So I didn't count the money. 15 16 I didn't do anything. I just left it there. Went to bed. He comes home, and he wakes me up. And he tells me to --17 he says, "Where's the money at?" I said, "I left it," I 18 19 said. He says, "You're supposed to put that money away." So he drags me out of bed and down to the store. And I had 20 to go and get the cash and do what I'm supposed to do, have 21 22 done with it. And then he says, "Well, where's my supper?" I said, "It's in the oven," you know? Well, he says, "Warm 23 up my supper." There was no microwaves then. 24

25

So this went on. And then one night I heard

23

something, and I felt something on my head here. And then he -- he was there hollering at me to wake up. So I woke up. It was a rifle. Where did that (indiscernible) [pointed at my head] He wanted me to get up and do the cash and things like that. He did that for about two years. Every night. Same thing. I was beginning to hate that man.

8 Anyway, one day I got up. Then I went down 9 in the basement. And I found the rifle. And I made sure 10 that it wasn't (indiscernible) [was emptied]. And I went 11 upstairs with the rifle. He was sitting on the couch. And 12 I pointed the rifle and -- then he looks at me and says, 13 "What the?" You know, I don't like to swear.

14MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: I think that's [can15guess] what he said.

MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And he says, "What are you doing?" And I told, I said, "Do you know now what it feels like to be woken up with that pointed at you?" "Put that damn thing away." "Don't be so foolish." I said, "The next time you do that make sure that there's a bullet in there and make sure you pull the trigger." My kids were still in there.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

24 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I don't know what
25 they thought of their mother. So he jumped up and he

1 grabbed the rifle and he started pushing me around. But 2 that was just another (indiscernible) [day]. You know? MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And what year did you 3 finally tell him to get out and you leave him? 4 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: What? MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: What year did you 6 7 finally go though? You did, did you? Didn't you say you left and you finally told him you've had enough? 8 9 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: No. I just stayed, 10 and then one -- he -- he was home for a change. First time ever home early. 11 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 12 M′hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: The kids were 13 watching TV and I guess they had a little argument, the 14 kids. You know how boys are. 15 16 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And he was in the 17 room I guess trying to sleep or something. I don't know 18 what he was trying to do. And then he comes out. He was 19 20 ripping mad. And he was telling the kids to keep quiet 'cause he's trying to sleep. And he grabbed the oldest 21 22 one, [Son 2] and he started beating him up. And that's 23 when I broke. I got -- I couldn't do it anymore. Those 24 were my babies.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

1 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: [Son 2] was 14, but 2 it's still my baby. I was so furious with him. I took him to my floor and I started fighting with him and I told him, 3 "No more. I can't do this." But he started fighting back 4 at me. He started kicking me and he left. Walked out and 5 he says, "I'll be back." So I -- that night, I said to my 6 son, my [myself, I] -- "No. Can't do no more." 7 So I called [R. C.]. She was 8 9 (indiscernible) [working with] alcohol and drugs. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I think. I told her 11 I didn't know what I -- what to do no more. And then she 12 said something about this place, transmission. Well, 13 transition, but we call it transmission. 14 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. 15 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And that's the first 16 I ever heard it. And she said, "I'll put you there." So 17 that night I packed the kid's clothes, and I put them in 18 the car. I had my own car. And yeah, I just [and he had 19 his] -- and I was going to school. I went back to school. 20 So I told my children, I said, "You guys go to school. And 21 I'll pick you guys up." I didn't tell them we were -- that 22 I was taking them. 23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 24 Right. 25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I just told them to

go to school. I'll just go pick them up at dinner time, 1 2 'cause they usually come home dinner time. So the youngest one, she was in daycare. And [Ex-Husband] wasn't even 3 home. God only knows where (indiscernible) believe me I 4 5 [but anyway] -- I wasn't going to back down anymore. So I -- I went to school like, you know, like nobody's business. 6 I went to school. Then [R.C.] called me and she -- she 7 said, "I can't get you in a transition house like that." 8 9 She said, "But if you know how to get to [New] Glasgow," I didn't even know where the hell [New] Glasgow was. She 10 said, "They have a place there like transition house." And 11 it was called (indiscernible) house. So I said -- I said, 12 "Okay." She said, "Get on the highway. Just stay on the 13 highway until you see the sign Glasgow." She said, 14 "They'll meet you at the gas station at the red barn." I 15 said, "Okay." 16

So I went there, at the gas station red barn. And they took us to transition, the (indiscernible) house. And that was a Native woman there, working there, [C.N.] --

22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- [C.N]. And she
23 knew [Ex-Husband], and I was so scared.

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN:

M'hm.

24 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But she said, "Not

to worry," she said. "I have a job. And my job is to 1 2 protect the kids and..." 3 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 4 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? She said, 5 "I would never, ever do that." So we stayed there -- we were there like, three months. And then finally, they got 6 7 room at transition, so we came back. And for some I don't know how he did -- no. We -- he won -- he won the request 8 9 to see the kids. So we agreed to go to the -- in the 10 public place. I think --MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- the park. And I 12 had somebody with me and -- and he had the kids. And --13 and then they were -- he was with the kids for a while, and 14 then we went back. And then the kids said, "We want to 15 move home with dad, " 'cause I just started getting tired of 16 being in --17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 18 19 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- you know? So I 20 went home with him. And that. He said and that everything 21 is going to be okay. Didn't last. 22 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 23 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? So this time I said, "Well, I'm not going to run away to the 24 25 Glasgow," but I did. Because he didn't know anything about

-- but he knew where the transition house was. 1 2 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Right. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So I got my kids and 3 4 my -- at the time, my youngest daughter, she was visiting 5 her uncle and her aunt in the campground. So you know, I had to leave without her. So we only stayed in there like, 6 for that weekend, and then we came back to Sydney, to here. 7 And my brother, my sons were -- they wanted their sister, 8 9 you know? They wanted her with us. So I said, "I don't know how we're going to do this," he says. "Well, here --10 here's like this, mom. We'll go and keep me and [Son 3] 11 we'll go and keep auntie busy and uncle; go talk to them. 12 And then [Son 1] is with [Daughter] he'll take [Daughter] 13 to the -- bring [Daughter] to the car." He says, "You 14 don't go in the campground, mom. You just sit right 15 there." 16 17 So that's what we did. They went in to visit their aunt and their uncle, and just before they left 18 they told [Son 1], "Start walking with [Daughter] to the 19 car," 'cause she wanted to see mom too. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So they did. They 23 got her -- they got her, and they left. They got in the car and we left, you know? And then [Ex-Husband] was 24 25 having a fit because I got my daughter back. And

another -- another three months in transmission house. 1 2 Then we had a court hearing. I was there, and we waited, and we waited, and no [Ex-Husband]. His lawyer was there, 3 4 and he was flipping because [Ex-Husband] wasn't there. So the judge reviewed my -- my files and he says, "Mrs. 5 Christmas," he says, "you've been in the (indiscernible) 6 house for three months." I said, "Yeah." He says, "Well, 7 I'm granting you the divorce." He says, "You have 8 9 children. It's no place for children. 21 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So I called him. 22 And he came over. He pinned my husband up to the wall and 23 he told him, "You were ordered never to enter this house. 24 You lay one hand on my sister, there won't be anything left 25 of you." So he left, and he never came back. I guess he

And I told him that --3 to leave 'cause I couldn't. 4 5 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Hard to trust. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: No. So it took four 6 7 years, another four years, and then he came back into my life. You know, well, he said he was sorry and all that 8 9 stuff. And we got along, and we got married August 15th, 10 2004. And we used to go out to [K.]'s mom. We used to 11 camp there. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: All the time. 13 So that's where we got married. So, on our first anniversary, 14 we went to Lunenburg 'cause he was one of those with the --15 16 that did that program they have on now about the pirate's stash. God, (indiscernible) [what was the name of that 17 thing]? It's a weekly show they have on. 18 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Oak Island? 19 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Oak Island. 20 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Oh, he -- he was --23 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Treasure hunt. MS. He's Irish from Banakade (ph). And so we went there, and 1 2 we spent a weekend up there. And then he says, "You know," he says, "when we go back we have to stop at Moose Cabin." 3 He says, "It's going to be our first anniversary." I said, 4 5 "Yeah. I know." So we went and came back. We went to the Moose Cabin and that day, and that day he says, "I'm going 6 to the cave." I said, "All right." So we start up walking 7 together. And I know that that happened 'cause I had -- my 8 9 legs were bad then. So he says, "You know, you sit here and rest," he says. "I'm going to go the rest of the way." 10 I said, "Fine." So he went. 11

When he came back, it was hard to explain 12 what he looked like. I don't know what it was, but there 13 was something very strange about -- and it just didn't 14 click in my head until later. 24	MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah.
25	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: M'hm.

1 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Those aren't usually 2 very good things. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: They do. They're 3 totally different people, you know? In my family, it's a 4 5 long line of alcoholics. I'm an alcoholic myself. But I haven't drank any (indiscernible) over three [in forty-6 three] years. 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Congratulations. 8 That's 9 a win. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. I just 10 happened to see myself one day. I woke up, my son was --11 the oldest one, he was -- he was just two. Was he two? He 12 wasn't quite -- yeah, he was two. And I was living with my 13 -- living at my uncle's house, [Uncle]'s place. And I 14 know, me and Ron were [we were on a] drunk that weekend. 15 16 And I'm one of those mean drunks, you know? I always say I wasn't really [was a mean] drunk. I don't know, can't 17 remember what I all said. And so that morning, 18 (indiscernible) the weekend, so come Monday morning I woke 19 up, and I was on the couch. And then I woke up, I was 20 sitting on the couch. And my two-year old comes out of the 21 22 room. He places (indiscernible) [The place is beer bottles 23 everywhere, broken glass everywhere. Place stunk like hell. (Indiscernible) [And he comes out of the room and I 24 25 look at him]. I don't know how old that diaper was on him.

Could have been all weekend, I don't know. 1 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 2 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: He had a bottle of 3 milk, sour as can be. You (indiscernible) [He was standing 4 there and he was looking at me and I was looking at him and 5 I said]. "Oh my God, what the hell is wrong with me? You 6 know, you just think. [It just hit me] And I felt so bad. 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 8 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 'Cause I was looking 9 10 at my son [standing there], and you know, [and there was no need for it] he knows (indiscernible). And here was, here 11 (indiscernible) [beer bottles everywhere] the house was a 12 mess. And I said, "That's it." I said, "I'm never going 13 to touch another rum [bottle] again." And that was it. 14 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's amazing. 15 16 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I still have that imagination. I still have that --17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Picture of him? 18 19 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- picture of him standing there at the door. Holding his bottle. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And that was that. 23 And my second youngest mind you, he asked him, [Son 3] he says, he -- he did a paper in school on -- on rum [me] and 24 25 on there he says, "My mom gave up drinking because of me."

And he wasn't even born. But that's what he believed. 1 2 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yeah. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Right. Yeah. 3 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? 4 5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: He was just out of 6 baby diapers. 7 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I still have that --I still have that paper in my -- in my -- the letter that 8 9 he wrote. Oh my God. Yeah. So now, today my boys are 10 very protective of me. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 11 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Very protective. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's based on what 13 14 they see happen and so --MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, there was a 15 16 time a few years back, before -- before John and I got back 17 together again; there was a time that we are [year] 2000, early 2004. And [Ex-Husband] came over and we were 18 talking. And we are civil to each other, you know? I -- I 19 don't -- I don't --20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Oh, good for you. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- I don't have no 23 hate for the man, you know? And we do talk to each other, but --24 25 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah.

1 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- just as ordinary 2 people. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 3 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Anyway, that day, he 4 5 decide he wants to move back, he wants to come back into my life. Well, I said, "Well, I better think about this." 6 "Oh, take all the time you want, dear." (indiscernible) 7 all day, [I said alright] so I talked to (indiscernible) 8 9 [the boys]. And (indiscernible) said, "Hang on." [the boys said, "no mom"] He says, "And if you do, (indiscernible)." 10 "Your mind," he says, "so why," [well never mind] he says, 11 "call dad, tell him to come over." So I did. Told him to 12 come over, and the boys were sitting in there. And 13 (indiscernible) [they told him, they] says, "Dad, I'm not 14 young anymore. We're all adults, and if you lay a hand on 15 mom, I'm going to get you this time." So he 16 (indiscernible) [walked out the door]. That was that. 17 Yeah. Because the boy said it's not going to 18 (indiscernible) [happen]. And they said, "We're only doing 19 this to protect you." And they met John. Poor John. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: He had to be interviewed 21 22 by them, I presume? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But they did like 23 him, you know? They got to know him, and they did like 24 25 him.

Shirley Christmas (Emma Ann Paul) 1 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Well, you are one strong 2 lady. I have to say. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, that's what 3 4 people keep telling me. 5 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Well, it's --**UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** M'hm. 6 7 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But sometimes I don't feel strong. But lately now like a lot of my bad 8 9 days, I call them my bad years are out in the open, and then I find that I'm a total different person. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: I think it's a 11 (indiscernible) [weight off you]. 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Because I've learned 13 how to let go of the negativity in my life. Let go of my 14 past. I've learned to -- to accept it and it does not run 15 16 my life anymore. 17 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Good for you. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, I have a 18 19 responsibility to myself. So I have to do things for me and not everybody else, including my children. 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, I -- I 23 love my children dearly, but I do have allowing [a line] that where my life is just as important as anybody else's. 24 25 You know, so now I'm -- I do a lot of things for myself. I

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do (indiscernible) art [I write]. I -- I'm -- I have -- I'm 1 2 reviewing three of my books. I have four books, but I'm only doing [reviewing] three. I -- John had a -- a 3 4 company, a publishing company which is called 5 (indiscernible) Books. And when he passed away, before he passed away, he gave me the rights to (indiscernible) 6 Books. The first 11 years of (indiscernible) I couldn't do 7 nothing. I -- I just couldn't. 8 9 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 10 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: It was an emotional thing. 11 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 12 Yeah. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I found it very 13 hard, and I couldn't do it because every time I tried, I 14 think of John, you know? So there was the day I said to 15 16 myself -- this was about -- this was about a year ago. I decided if I want to do my own thing, I'm going to have to 17 change the name of -- instead of (indiscernible). So I did 18 my spiritual -- I smudged, I prayed. I talked to John, you 19 20 know? I went up to the mountain where I let his ashes go. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And I went up there 23 and I talked, I told him that I wanted (indiscernible) [to revise] books. I also wanted to start writing again. I 24 25 said, "But," I said, "each time I do so under

(indiscernible) name I feel it's not mine. I think it's 1 2 yours." I said, "I want to change owner with [I want to put] a name Sweetgrass and Sage." I said, "I know you're 3 not going to answer me." So a couple weeks after that ${\tt I}$ 4 5 got my answer in a dream. And -- and he, he was quite happy. 6 So I tried. I tried to do it on my own. 7 Then I got this overwhelming feeling that it's not the 8 9 same. It's not going to turn out, it's not going to be like John's, you know? 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 11 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And so I -- I -- I 12 I only did one book. (Indiscernible). [My new 13 stopped. one] Yesterday, what was that? The Me of Yesterday and 14 the Me of Today, that's my fourth book. So I did that. 15 And but I still -- I don't know what it was. It was just 16 something that wasn't -- and then a few weeks ago I was 17 saying, I said, "Shirley Christmas, get off your ass and do 18 something." I says, "You can't keep being negative about 19 20 that." I says, "You have to start. If you want something, get it done." 21 22 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Yeah. [Make it happen] 23 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So I started. And you've got to hear this. Last week I was looking through 24

25 books. I have boxes of stuff way back before John passed

away. This was way back in the 90's. 1 2 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: This was '93, '94. 3 '94, '93. No, '93. And there were boxes there. So I was 4 looking through the boxes. There was -- I see this title. 5 I was looking, you know that. So I kept looking at it, and 6 then it dawned on me. That title was supposed to be the 7 first book that I published; Sons of Membertou. Sons of 8 9 Membertou was not the original there [name], but I forgot about that. I couldn't find it, you know? If I don't see 10 something I don't remember. 11 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: 12 M'hm. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And John wanted the 13 name for the book to get done (indiscernible) write it 14 [because he wanted them printed]. So he says, "Well, how 15 about we go with Sons of Membertou?" I said, "Yeah. Okay. 16 Fine." You know? And I did not find that paper until 17 October 16th, 24 years after the day the book was put out. 18 19 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: WOW. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And I found that 20 title. So I was sitting there. And I said, "When I revise 21 22 Sons of Membertou, it's going to be called, The Dawn of My Beginning," because that's what that's poetry is all about. 23 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 24 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: It's all about me 25

1 learning about my Mi'kmag roots. All the (indiscernible) 2 [torments] and all the -- the heartbreaks and stuff. That was the original. So I talked to the (indiscernible) [Sons 3 of Membertou, I told them and they agreed]. 4 5 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Good for you. That's (indiscernible) [Congratulations]. 6 7 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So that's my -that's what I'm doing nowadays. 8 9 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Good for you. 10 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, I'm a writer. I know I'm a writer, and I write stories. I do 11 poetry, you know? I'm not famous, but I'm doing what I 12 like to do. 13 14 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And that's important. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: So --15 16 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Really important. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But when it comes to 17 sales stuff, I'm lousy. 18 19 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: That's hard work. Before we just chat any further, is there anything else you 20 want to say on the record that you want the commissioners 21 22 to know about this Inquiry? You know, what changes you 23 hope come from it, you know? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Well, I know I have 24 25 a friend, a close friend. She lost her sister in

1 (indiscernible) five [about twenty-five] years, and they still haven't found her. And I think about her a lot. And 2 I know she's not getting [giving up] -- and I wish, I 3 really do wish with all my heart that this -- whoever these 4 5 people are --**MS. DEBBIE BODKIN:** The commissioners? 6 7 Like... 8 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah -- would help 9 her. 10 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Would you want -- what's her name and we'll put it on the record? 11 12 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Agnes Gould. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Gould? 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Yeah. 14 15 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Just, how do you spell her last name? 16 17 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: G-O-U-L-D. Her -her sister, Virginia. 18 19 **MS. DEBBIE BODKIN:** Gould as well? MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: 20 Yes. 21 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Same -- same name? 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I don't know what 23 her last name is. But she disappeared. She was in a bad 24 relationship. 25 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm.

1 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: And to this day, 2 they haven't found her. MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: And do you know, does, 3 is Agnes, does she know about the Commission and? 4 5 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Agnes? No. She's -- she's downstairs. 6 7 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. Good. MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: She -- she -- she's 8 9 -- I guess in a way --10 **MS. DEBBIE BODKIN:** (Indiscernible) MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- she had helped me 11 to speak out about my own traumas, you know? Because like 12 I said before, I would never spoke to anyone about my 13 ordeals and my --14 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. Well, I really 15 16 appreciate you taking the time to tell me today. 17 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know, and with my younger sister, I just kept that to myself because I 18 felt guilty about it and about letting her down. 19 20 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Well, you're a strong woman. And (indiscernible). 21 22 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I try -- I try to 23 convince myself. Eventually I will. Except that I --MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: It wasn't your fault. 24 25 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- and that I wasn't

MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Not at all. 2 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- you know? But 3 right now I still feel bad. 4 5 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** M'hm. 6 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: It takes time. 7 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: But with this Inquiry, I hope that it would give answers to a lot of 8 9 questions that people are looking for --MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. Yeah. 10 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: -- to find their 11 loved ones. 12 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: I wish the same. 13 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: I know it's not 14 easy. I know it's a rough road for a lot of them. 15 MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: M'hm. 16 17 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: You know? MS. DEBBIE BODKIN: Okay. I'm going to shut 18 the camera off now. It is five after 3, and I'm going to 19 shut the cameras off and we'll --20 MS. SHIRLEY CHRISTMAS: Holy crap, I got a 21 22 big mouth. --- Upon adjourning at 3:05 p.m. 23
