

| 17 | where you presently reside? |
| 18 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: On Opitsaht. |
| 19 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: And can you tell me |
| 20 | your occupation? |
| 21 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: I'm disabled. I do a lot |
| 22 | of carving. |
| 23 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Carving? |
| 24 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Yeah, carvingwi. |

| 7 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: I'm thinking that after |
| 8 | my sister was found there was an article about a found |
| 9 | missing young lady and the way the cops put it, it was |
| 10 | probable suicide. And you know, she was beautiful and had |
| 11 | the world in her hand. She had everything going for her. |
| 12 | She would not take her life. And our parents taught us |
| 13 | suicide is the biggest sin you could ever commit. |
| 14 | And you are and a lot of people, they |
| 15 | commit suicide and the priests say they havent gone to |
| 16 | (inaudible). They don't (inaudible) those souls til the |
| 17 | Creator who takes them. |
| 18 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 19 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: When my sister went |
| 20 | missing March 1980 I wasn't travelling with my mom and my |
| 21 | dad. We have a younger brother. His name was Herbert |
| 22 | Frank and we had a younger sister named Theresa Frank. And |
| 23 | I kind of stayed home with them. And my mom and them went |
| 24 | on every lead. |

And I was at home and I can't recall the

| 1 | date the phone rang and I answered the phone. They said, |

| 3 | And the joy to happiness went way up and end |
| 4 | in anger. And I said, "Holy." |
| 5 | They said, "We found her and she's gone." |
| 6 | I knocked the wall phone right off the wall. |
| 7 | Just flopped on the floor and cried. |
| 8 | My mom hung onto it because she loved all of |
| 9 | us equally and all of us the same. She wanted justice for |
| 10 | her daughter, for her princess. That's what she wanted. |
| 11 | That's what we all want. |
| 12 | And I told my mom, "One day, Mom, I'm going |
| 13 | to find out who done it and I'm going to kill him." And I |
| 14 | promised my mom if the cops find out who done it and put |
| 15 | him in jail, I'll go to jail. I'll find him and kill him |
| 16 | there. |
| 17 | I've been starting in 1980 and I carry it, |
| 18 | the hurt and anger til 2009, 29 years. |
| 19 | My mom always told me, "Don't carry the |
| 20 | grief too long. It turns to anger." And I guess I didn't |
| 21 | realize with my mom because I held onto it for 29 years. |
| 22 | And one of my my youngest sister, |
| 23 | Theresa, she's gone now she had a daughter who's very |
| 24 | beautiful. She named her Iris. |
| 25 | We have a cousin from my father's older |

| 4 | And before coming to this conference I |
| 5 | picked up a newspaper and it happens on the page I find the |
| 6 | RCMP are looking for some missing lady and it bubbles a |
| 7 | whole ball of anger. All they had was missing lady's |
| 8 | location. |
| 9 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Yeah. |
| 10 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: And just like, they all |
| 11 | trigger flashbacks. Why didn't they do this for my sister? |
| 12 | Why? They're sitting there. This is (inaudible) and I'm |
| 13 | not going to let it go. I'm not going to lose her. Or I |
| 14 | could take it to her somewhere so make a wish, and if the |
| 15 | wish would come true maybe I'll find out who done this to |
| 16 | our princess. |
| 17 | It's so we a lot of our I'm |
| 18 | listening to them and I kind of agree with some of that, |
| 19 | what's going on in there and I kind of disagree. Their |
| 20 | missing people, they're saying they hope they're found so |
| 21 | that they could have closure. |
| 22 | [Iris] went missing. And she was found. |
| 23 | There's still no closure because we don't know what |
| 24 | happened to her. But we all know in our family, we know |

she never took her own life. We know that. And when we

| 1 | say she never she wouldn't take her life (inaudible) |

| 2 | here because we all knew her. |
| 3 | I guess a lot of them I don't even know |
| 4 | if my siblings remember that my mom and Iris were close, |
| 5 | real close. My mom had a blue jacket and it was a winter |
| 6 | jacket with fur on it. And my sister Iris started calling |
| 7 | my mom Eskimo. So they both called each other Eskimo. |
| 8 | And we had parents but they weren't just |
| 9 | parents. They were our friends. They done a lot with us, |
| 10 | my parents. When would follow us, watching us play ball. |
| 11 | They say (inaudible) being a parent I was our parents |
| 12 | my dad was my best friend. |
| 13 | And I think that's how my mom was with all |
| 14 | of my sisters. Maybe she didn't tell them but if you could |
| 15 | see from here you could know, you could tell that kind of |
| 16 | (inaudible). |
| 17 | Yeah. And I'm 59 and it looks like I was |
| 18 | 20, 21 when 2009 was when she went missing and I came |
| 19 | into town, bar hopping, listening, seeing if anybody can |
| 20 | talk about it. |
| 21 | And my mom sat me down to talk to me. She |
| 22 | talked to me, then told me not to do what I said I was |
| 23 | going to do. She said, "It's in the Creator's hands now." |
| 24 | And the pressure that I was carrying, the load I was |
| 25 | carrying after I was taught that, that was a couple of |

| 3 | like I said, it's been 37 years, so the sooner the better |
| 4 | but whether it takes 10 years and we get an answer, that's |
| 5 | great. My son and them won't have to wonder. These kids |
| 6 | will be (inaudible). |
| 7 | [Registrar's note: confidential testimony omitted]. |
| 8 | Some have taken the wrong path and some have made a good |
| 9 | life for themselves. |
| 10 | And just like during this and everything is |
| 11 | I remember walking, holding it, my sister's casket, walking |
| 12 | with my aunts had my aunt had to be pried off to let |
| 13 | go. It was one of my cousins. She had to come across and |
| 14 | had to pull my hand off. |
| 15 | But yeah. And the ones weren't were |
| 16 | there, I was (inaudible) because one of the questions I |
| 17 | asked and I asked. Like, with today, if we say we give you |
| 18 | permission to ask for those coroner's reports and the |
| 19 | police report and if you do get that and just say can you |
| 20 | have it sent to us? |
| 21 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: What? |
| 22 | [WITNESS 1]: If we want the coroner's |
| 23 | report and the police report. |
| 24 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Yeah. |

MR. ARNOLD FRANK: If we have given you

| 6 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: And I don't know if my |
| 7 | [family members] heard, but I know my dad said when they |
| 8 | found her about three weeks in water. I don't know if he |
| 9 | touched her, but he said she was real soft. |
| 10 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 11 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: And that really hurt |
| 12 | coming from my dad. |
| 13 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 14 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Yeah. I was telling the |
| 15 | people in the conference that this lady, she was a shell. |
| 16 | The shell is gone. But she's still in here. All the |
| 17 | memories that I have, we look at each other and we smile. |
| 18 | That's how I'm telling people she gives me strength because |
| 19 | she's here. And I look at her every day like I look at my |
| 20 | mom and my dad every day because they're here, little |
| 21 | pictures that my mom said the camera can never capture, |
| 22 | just ones that you have in your heart. |
| 23 | And there's not a day I still think about my |
| 24 | sister or my dad or my mom. I (inaudible) the ones that |
| 25 | are gone. |

| 1 | And I didn't really tell people about that. |
|----|-------------------------------------------------------------|
| 2 | I was talking to somebody and they were talking about, oh, |
| 3 | like, my parents are dead. |
| 4 | I smile at them. "But they never die." |
| 5 | Where do you get this, what's running |
| 6 | through our heart? Where do you ever get it? Where do |
| 7 | you get the blood that runs through our heart? That's my |
| 8 | mom's and my dad's blood, still pumping through us and it |
| 9 | will never die. |
| 10 | And I've got the memories of her in my |
| 11 | heart, that won't die. |
| 12 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 13 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: For sure now, |
| 14 | (inaudible). And I hope maybe if you can access the truth |
| 15 | so it's going to continue for final truth. |
| 16 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So I had some more |
| 17 | questions but I can also see that it's noon. So we can |
| 18 | take a break so people can eat and regain their strength |
| 19 | and then we can continue after lunch, or we can keep going, |
| 20 | whichever you'd prefer. |
| 21 | [Registrar's note: confidential testimony |
| 22 | omitted]. |
| 23 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Take a break? Okay. |
| 24 | So we will pause it for lunch. And take all the time you |
| 25 | need and then just come back and then we'll continue, okay? |

| 11 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 12 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: To get back to your |
| 13 | question, the one you just asked. The situation she got in |
| 14 | was like she was open, trusting. And that can be a real |
| 15 | vulnerable area and guys can take advantage of that. |
| 16 | So I would say as long the (inaudible) have |
| 17 | to trust (inaudible) take advantage. So that's how my |
| 18 | sister was. She just liked chatting with people a lot. |
| 19 | She didn't care who you were, what colour you were. She |
| 20 | was always friendly and talked and that. You know, that |
| 21 | was the (inaudible). It's the trust that she had and the |
| 22 | openness. |
| 23 | Because it could be a problem because |
| 24 | everywhere (inaudible) she trusted too fast. |
| 25 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: So do you think that's |

| 1 | something that we can teach children today? Do you have |

| 3 | need to change the way that we're raising men as well as |

| 5 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Well, that's what I said |
| 6 | in that thing. My mother it never came up. I was |
| 7 | (inaudible) so my mom always told me. I've got to respect |
| 8 | women. I had to respect my sister and my mom. And I |
| 9 | wouldn't want anybody doing to my sister what I was doing |
| 10 | to the young ladies out there. And that's what I've been |
| 11 | teaching my son in the past 24 years, 22 years. |
| 12 | The women, they give us our life and they |
| 13 | should be treated with respect. And I was just surprised |
| 14 | when I picked up that Declaration and that's what they had |
| 15 | written on there and my mom had told me that years ago, |
| 16 | that women should be respected. |
| 17 | But now that's what our parents, |
| 18 | especially mothers, and the dads have got to teach the |
| 19 | young fellows that women should be respected at all times |
| 20 | as men. |
| 21 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 22 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: And no matter the race or |
| 23 | reputation. They deserve the same respect that you got for |
| 24 | your mom and for your sisters. |

MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Can I ask, what was it

| 1 | for you that changed? What brought you to the realization |

| 3 | fact that your mother kept just reminding you of it or was |
| 4 | it something else? |
| 5 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: It's one day she just |
| 6 | asked me how I would like it if men were treating my |
| 7 | sisters and my nieces and my granddaughters the way I |
| 8 | treated them. |
| 9 | And I'm one of the guys that was in a |
| 10 | relationship for a few years and it was (inaudible). |
| 11 | That's like other kind of abuses still stuck there. |
| 12 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 13 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Asking what I was doing. |
| 14 | Sometimes (inaudible). That's why she was always saying, |
| 15 | "Be careful what you say." (Inaudible) can't grab it, it's |
| 16 | gone. Once it's past, the damage is done. |
| 17 | She talked like that to all my brothers. I |
| 18 | just wish that I had (inaudible) more to listen but I wish |
| 19 | (inaudible) vulnerable. My dad was saying, It's so easy to |
| 20 | listen. But to hear," he said, "You listen over here and |
| 21 | you hear right here." |
| 22 | A lot of stuff I learned from my mom. |
| 23 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Okay. So for the |
| 24 | current young generation, for future generations, what can |
| 25 | we do not just what can we do as a family. But what |

| 1 | should society be doing to protect Indigenous peoples, |

| 2 | women and girls? What aren't they doing and what should |
| 3 | they be doing? |
| 4 | This is your opportunity to tell our |
| 5 | Commissioners what they should be putting in their report, |
| 6 | their recommendations. |
| 7 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Another recommendation is |
| 8 | that when the sexual offenders, the sexual abusers are |
| 9 | caught, the penalties should be higher, stiffer. Eighteen |
| 10 | (18) months is just like a holiday. Two years is a like a |
| 11 | holiday. But the damage that's done to a woman lasts their |
| 12 | life. And the sentence they get is just like calendar |
| 13 | days. |
| 14 | If the penalties aren't stiffer |
| 15 | especially when it comes down to all people. One of our |
| 16 | granddaughters used to (inaudible). They got other kids; |
| 17 | they get that guy to go to court. They're on probation for |
| 18 | five years. So it's okay; go out and do it again. That's |
| 19 | what they're saying. |
| 20 | They get two years. Well, when you get out |
| 21 | you can do it again. That's the (inaudible), sexual |
| 22 | priors. They live off that. |
| 23 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 24 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: It doesn't go away after |
| | |

they got sentenced. I think (inaudible) because I was

| 1 | sexually abused when I was eight years old. But we're not |

| 3 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Would you want to |
| 4 | prevent children from being put in the same position that |
| 5 | you were in? |
| 6 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: M'hm. |
| 7 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: Have you any ideas? |
| 8 | Anything that your experience brings to the table is |
| 9 | welcome. |
| 10 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: Well, I told my son. I |
| 11 | said, "Let me know if anybody hurts you or touches you." |
| 12 | And he said, "Yeah, okay, Dad." |
| 13 | And I said, "Well, can you do that?" And |
| 14 | then I went about it the wrong way (inaudible) if something |
| 15 | happened to him: "I don't want my dad to go to jail." |
| 16 | MR. BREEN OUELLETTE: M'hm. |
| 17 | MR. ARNOLD FRANK: And then I talked to him |
| 18 | again and I told him, "We'll go through the proper way. |
| 19 | We'll call the cops. We'll deal with it right." And |
| 20 | that's the (inaudible) stuff going on. |
| 21 | I asked and he was, "Dad, who can I trust? |
| 22 | Who can I talk to?" |
| 23 | And he said, "Well, you can trust all my |
| 24 | relatives." I said, "No. That's where it starts. It |
| 25 | starts in house. Just nobody anybody that touches you |
