Statement - Public 1 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi) Yellowknife, Northwest Territories 1 --- Upon commencing on Thursday, January 25, 2018, 2 3 at 1:43 p.m. 4 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: This is Marie Audrey with MMIWG. We are in Yellowknife. The time is 5 6 1:43, and we are January 25. I will just ask everyone in 7 the room to present themselves, please. 8 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: My name is Martha 9 Mercredi. And I will spell it for you. Martha, 10 Mercredi, Mercredi. 11 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Thank you. 12 MS. RUTH MERCREDI: My name is Ruth. I'm 13 Martha's sister. 14 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Can I have your last name, as well? 15 16 MS. RUTH MERCREDI: Mercredi. 17 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Mercredi, as 18 well. Okay. 19 MS. ELIZABETH SHEIN: And Elizabeth Shein. So Elizabeth with a "Z." And Shein is, S h e i n. 20 21 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Excellent. 22 Okay. Thank you so much, Martha, for being with us this afternoon and putting your trust in us. As I discussed 23 before putting the video recorder on, I will ask you my 24 25 first question like this: What would you like to share

with us today? What would you like the Commissioners to 1 2 know about your story and about your truth? 3 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: My daughter Janelle, I would like to talk about her. She was murdered in 1986 4 between June the 3 and 4. How I found out was when she 5 6 didn't go to court for a month. She had a charge laid 7 against her -- no. A girl put a bottle to her eye and pulled it out. So she had one eye. And the same girl, 8 9 Janelle was going to court for. She was a witness. 10 And she never came home for a month. I was wondering where she was. So I went down to the 11 courthouse. They said she wasn't there. Then I went to 12 13 Grande Prairie. He didn't know what to do. And then 14 that's when my daughter phoned me, saying that they found 15 Janelle. She was in the bushes. There were animals, and 16 they ate her. I can still remember that. 17 They got the guys. Two brothers and a 18 sister. William Smoker (ph), Rose Smoker (ph), and what's the third one? I forget his name. And then we had the 19 court date for that. And they got 25 years to life in 20 prison. What they did to her was terrible. They used a 21 22 baseball bat, a knife, a needle with air in it, a chair. I 23 read this all in the news. I never read the news. She was in the wrong place at the wrong time, and she picked the 24 25 wrong people.

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Statement - Public 3 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi)

1 Rose Smoker picked my daughter and her 2 friend up and (indiscernible) for a party. And so they 3 went to the party. And then William Smoker, that's the guy who broke his arm. It wasn't even him. It was someone 4 5 else that broke his arms. So they started to fight, and 6 Janelle was trying to get out the window in the bathroom. 7 She was climbing out, but they broke down the door, and they grabbed her and pulled her back in. 8 Today I still think of her. Every day -- not a day goes 9 10 by I don't think of her. It's been -- 1986. It's been 11 quite a few years. I'm doing a lot better than I did. I 12 13 think I'm doing a lot better. I still think of her. She 14 was a prostitute, and she was there with her friend. She 15 wanted to come home, so she phoned her dad and asked him to 16 pay her way back. And he said no. Sometimes I blame him for that. But I can't do that, because how was he supposed 17 18 to know what's going to happen? You know what I mean? So 19 I forgave him. I tried not to think of it but sometimes 20 I'm thinking in my head (indiscernible). 21 When we buried her, I was hanging onto the coffin. I was saying, "Why, Creator? Why?" She was only 22 20. I can't even cry. I feel like crying, but it's just 23 so hard. This isn't even bad, is it? My sister has been a 24 25 great help to me. If it wasn't for her today, I'm telling

you, I would have gone crazy. She tells me the truth. 1 2 She does help me when she tells me the 3 truth. She just tells me things, and I listen to her because she does a lot of this kind of work, and she knows 4 what I'm going through. So she has been helping me a lot. 5 6 I lost my daughter Shelly to drugs. She was a hooker too, 7 a prostitute, I should say. Both my daughters were in the wrong place at the wrong time, you know. And I tried to 8 get them off the streets. I would go down there and pull 9 10 Janelle out, bring her home. Shelly, too. 11 I used to go down there and get Shelly to come home. But they would end up right back out there. So 12 13 these girls had a hard life, even for how young they were. 14 I tried it -- to hook one night. You know what the quy 15 said? He said, "You don't belong here." He gave me \$40. 16 I thought, "Oh, my god. What am I doing 17 down here?" When I went back to the bar, I gave the guy the money, and I left. I said, "I don't know how they do 18 19 it, but I couldn't do it." She was a happy-go-lucky kid, Janelle. And Shelly. They were always doing something for 20 21 me at Christmas time. We would sit there, have a beer, and 22 decorate the tree. I miss those times around Christmas. 23 So when my sister comes in, she helps me forget. You know, not really forget, but keep my mind 24 25 open. If I didn't have her, I don't know where I would be.

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Statement - Public 5 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi)

I got two boys. Patrick (ph) and Dwayne (ph) are their 1 names. I think the oldest one is spoiled rotten by me. He 2 3 is. He's spoiled rotten. Oh, my God. "Mom, mom, mom, mom." 4 5 Since I lost my two daughters, I hang onto 6 them. And Dwayne too, my other son, my baby. He never 7 asks me for anything. But Patrick "Mom, I need \$30." Something like that. All the time. He gets my whole 8 9 cheque. Thirty dollars is nothing. 10 When I get smart, I tell him, "I left my money at home." 11 "Okay, mom." I just hang onto them 12 13 because I don't want to lose them. I have my grandson with 14 me too. He helps me out a little bit at home. I just hope 15 that nothing bad happens to them because it's my whole life 16 right there. I don't know what I would do if I lost them. 17 What I wanted to find out when I went to 18 court for the murder to Janelle, I wanted them to go to 19 jail for life. But two of them got off, and one of them 20 took the whole blame. So that is why they let the other two out. He spent 25 years there. They were supposed to 21 22 get ahold of me if he came out, so I can go there and tell 23 them that he doesn't deserve to get out. But they never 24 did get ahold of me. That's the law. 25 I keep asking them. I phone them up. I

say, "When are you going to find out about William Smoker." 1 They don't give a damn. Sorry. It's just like they don't 2 3 care. And that's why I am trying to get someone to phone for me to see if he's still in jail. Everybody loved 4 Janelle. She had lots of friends (indiscernible). They 5 6 all told me that she was a very nice girl, even with what 7 she was doing. I accepted it. For the longest time, I couldn't. How can you sell your body like that? I tried 8 it. "Mom." She said that. 9 10 I said, "I wanted to see what you girls liked that so much for." I never tried it again. No 11 12 chance. No way. He wasn't even good in bed, anyway. Yes. 13 I did lots of stupid stuff when I was younger. Just 14 talking here just makes you feel good. My heart was heavy. 15 Now it's not. I didn't know what to say when I came in 16 here. Hanging onto this whole thing has made me feel do 17 you have any questions for me? 18 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: If you want, I 19 can ask more questions. Maybe, I would like, if it is okay, I would like to know a little bit more about 20

21 yourself. If you could tell a little bit about your story 22 personally. And then maybe I will ask a little bit more 23 questions about Janelle, if it is okay with you. 24 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: Okay.

25 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: If you can tell

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1 me about your background. Where you are coming from? To 2 know you as well and to know where you are coming from and 3 what is your background, if you want to share that with us, 4 as well.

5 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: Sure. My name is 6 Martha Mercredi. I am from Yellowknife, Northwest 7 Territories. Yellowknife is my hometown. And I used to live along the (indiscernible). My mother was a good 8 woman. She raised us well. I forget from a long time ago 9 10 because I had shock treatment because they thought I was going crazy because I drank beer and Aspirin together. So 11 they sent me to Edmonton, Alberta, hospital. And they did 12 13 ten days of -- what do you call it? Shock treatment.

Then my dad came to visit me and he says, "What are you doing in here? What the hell is going on?" My sister took me out with her. My dad says, "You don't belong in here. You're my daughter. This is for crazy people. And you aren't crazy," he told me. And I started to believe that. I was scared.

At night I used to put a chair there at the door and a dresser so nobody would come in while I'm sleeping. I would sleep on the floor with a pillow and a blanket. I would sleep on the floor. I was scared. They were doing those treatments. And people were walking around in a daze just like they're drunk or something.

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Statement - Public 8 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi)

They're on pills. So I stuck up for myself. I told the 1 doctor. I said, "I want to go home." I said, "I don't 2 3 belong here. My mind is okay." 4 "You won't get into any hospitals out here 5 in Alberta, because you're going home early," he said. 6 I said, "I don't care. Just get me out of 7 here." So my sister got me out of there. It was a rough road there. And I had four kids. Janelle, Shelly, 8 Patrick, and Dwayne. I had two miscarriages. I had 9 10 boyfriends that were mean to me, beat me up. I thought 11 that is what you're supposed to do. I didn't realize that a man shouldn't be hitting a woman, because I loved them so 12 13 much. And I went out with the wrong men. Some were good. 14 The good ones I let go of, and the bad ones I kept. That's 15 just the way it went. 16 So what else can I tell about myself? I 17 went to school. I went to Cree Peace (ph) down in the base 18 of Mylin (ph). They had a school there for 19 (indiscernible). I went there. I passed. Then I went to 20 True Peace (ph). I got my GED. So it made me very proud 21 of myself. I was proud of myself for that. 22 I never drank for years, too. Now and 23 then I have a beer. I used to think I was bad every time I did that, but I'm not doing anybody any wrong. I just have 24 25 my little beer with me, and people don't understand that.

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Statement - Public 9 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi)

1 "You can't drink. You can't drink. You can't drink." I'm
2 tired of people telling me what to do. "Martha, you should
3 do this."

Like, my friends now. That is my business. This is my business. Why are they telling me this? So I stopped hanging out with them. I have a friend who says, "You shouldn't be drinking that."

8 I said, "Why?" I have to think. They9 don't understand. Let's see what else.

MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Martha, do you mind if I take you back to when you mentioned that you were physically abused by your boyfriends? I was wondering if you ever reported this violence to the police or to an institution?

15 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: I never did. I 16 always seemed to get away from them when they were getting violent and everything. I would just stay away. Janelle's 17 18 dad and Shelly's dad, it was the same dad. He took a .22. 19 He wanted to kill himself. I was pregnant with Janelle and choking me to death. If it wasn't for his mother running 20 21 next door, he would have killed me. He was, like, choking 22 me. Bill Smith (ph) came in. He says, "[Boyfriend 1] what the hell are you doing?" And Bill would start fighting 23 24 with him and knocked him out.

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So his mother said, "You better go home,

Martha. When he wakes up, he's going to start doing that 1 again." She warned me. So I took off. I never went back 2 3 to him. I never phoned the police on him. And today I don't have a boyfriend or anything because I like the way 4 I'm living. I don't have to do this, do that for anybody. 5 6 My legs are buggered up and I don't feel like I don't 7 know. I'm just not ready for it. One day, maybe, I might find a man who would be good to me and my kids. They got 8 to like my kids, too. Can I have a break, please? 9 10 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Of course. Of 11 course. Whereupon break was taken 12 13 Whereupon recording resumes 14 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: The time is 15 2:13, and we are back with Martha. Martha, we were just 16 discussing -- sorry. I will be asking about your 17 daughters. If you can tell us a little bit about their upbringing, how they were, and if you want to share good 18 19 memories that you have of your two daughters with us, as 20 well. 21 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: Okay. Janelle was 22 born in Yellowknife. Shelly was born in Yellowknife. I gave up Shelly for adoption. Janelle, I kept. I named her 23 Priscilla Ann Marie (ph), Shelly, but they changed her 24 25 name. I named her after Elvis Presley's wife, but they

1 changed her name when she was adopted out.

2 Janelle was born here, and she went to 3 school. And then she was supposed to get a modeling job when she first came to Edmonton. And I don't know what 4 happened. I think [Cousin 1] her cousin [Cousin 1] 5 6 brought her down to drag (ph). That's how it all started. 7 I told [Cousin 1], I said, "What are you bringing her down there for?" I didn't know. But now, today, I forgive 8 9 [Cousin 1], too.

10 She was carnival queen in Fort Smith. She wrote me some nice letters. I still have them. Sometimes 11 12 I think of her, and I just pray. I know she's okay. Her 13 and Shelly and Deanna, my niece. They all used to hang out 14 together. Deanna was the last one to see her. She didn't 15 want Janelle to go downtown. But she says Janelle wanted 16 to go, so she went. That was the last day Deanna says she 17 saw her or heard from her. We were wondering where she 18 was. And all this time, she was dead in the bushes, 19 covered with a rug. I don't know how people can be so 20 mean, because I couldn't be that mean. Not me. I try to 21 get mad, but I can't. But I never forgave them yet. I 22 thought I could forgive them, but I never did. All three 23 of them that murdered my daughter.

I thank the RCMP because they reallylooked into it. And they are the ones that found out that

it was the Smokers that killed my daughter. The RCMP, the 1 police were pretty good with me. The newspapers weren't so 2 3 good. They published some piece about prostitution. The police said, "We can't do nothing about it because that's 4 just the way it is. They show it on TV." 5 6 So I said, "That's okay. I can stand it." 7 A lot of people talk about Joanna Rathmus (ph). Do you know Joanna Rathmus? She is a cousin to Janelle. I was 8 sitting there having lunch with her, and she knew all about 9 10 Janelle. Her age, her name. They're cousins. She is telling me how they were and that. They were good 11 12 memories. 13 I said, "Thank you for talking to me, my 14 girl," I said, "because I don't talk about it too much." I 15 said, "My sister is there. I can tell her." I would cry. 16 But today, I don't know. I guess I am trying to feel 17 strong. You know what I mean? 18 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Yes. 19 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: She was going to get married one time, Janelle. He was a nice kid. So we went 20 to look for wedding dresses. We went all over the place. 21 22 She was getting married, and I was really happy. She was going to get away from down in the drag and that. At the 23 last minute, she changed her mind. She broke his heart, 24 25 broke my heart because I wanted her to get married to him.

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Statement - Public 13 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi)

1 He was a really nice guy. She says, "Mom, I'm not ready 2 vet."

I said, "Okay." What else can you say, you know? Shelly, she lived in Saskatoon with her foster parents. One time me and Janelle were at my place decorating the tree. Janelle bought a case of beer, a 24 pack. We were putting up decorations. I said to my girl, "How am I going to get your sister up here?"

9 And Janelle said, "Mom, I'll phone the 10 police in Saskatoon and tell them to look for Shelly Ridel 11 (ph). Tell her, her mom is sick." Oh, my God. I couldn't 12 believe it. So she did that. The cops from Saskatoon went 13 looking for her because they knew her. They went looking 14 for her, and they told her that. Two days later there was 15 a knock on the door. There was Shelly and her boyfriend.

I'm telling you, the things we used to do, my daughter and I. That is the time she came back and she stayed. She didn't want to go back. Shelly was with me until she was 30. Not stayed with me, but she was always phoning me, and she had boyfriends. Nice guys.

I don't talk about her very much because I don't know. I just feel terrible I gave her up, and you know. But I couldn't bring up two small babies. I told my mom, I said, "I'm going to give her up."

My mom said, "Why?"

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Statement - Public 14 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi) I said, "I can't look after two babies. 1 2 It's too much." 3 She says, "Okay." So when they took her out of my arms, she was crying for me. I'll always 4 5 remember that. She was going to a strange place. But she 6 forgave me for that. 7 She says, "Mom, I'm so sorry. I did this to you," she said. 8 I said, "No. You didn't do nothing bad to 9 10 me. Me, I did." I said, "I'm sorry." And a couple days later she died. I couldn't get up there. I had no money, 11 nothing. I didn't know where to look for money for that. 12 13 But she had a good funeral, and that's all. She was only 14 30. 15 She needed a new lung, and the doctor told 16 her, "I put you at the bottom of the list because you did drugs." That's what he said. "I'm putting you down on the 17 list, way at the bottom," he said. That's what her doctor 18 19 said. 20 "Holy smokes," I said to Shelly. 21 "That's what he said, Mom." I wanted to 22 know who he was, but he wasn't in town. People shouldn't 23 be doing that. He's a doctor. He should be helping her, 24 not saying things like that. That's about all. 25 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: I might have one

last question. Here at the National Inquiry, our main goal 1 is to see where the violence against women -- Indigenous 2 3 women and girls is coming from and what we can do to stop this violence against Indigenous women and girls. 4 5 So I would like to ask you if you have any 6 recommendations or suggestions of what we can do to improve 7 the situation for the violence against Indigenous women and girls to stop. If you have any recommendations for the 8 government, for the community, for the family, we like to 9 10 ask about that to know what can be done for this violence 11 to stop. If you have, like, personal ideas or any 12 13 suggestions, and if you do not have suggestions, it is not a problem either. But if you have any idea of what we can 14 15 do to improve this situation for there to be less violence 16 against Indigenous women and girls? What, in your opinion, should be done? 17

18 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: Hang them. Hang the 19 son-of-a-bitch (laughter). No. Us women, too -- I mean, 20 the young girls, they stay with their boyfriends, and when they touch them or hit them or anything, they think that is 21 22 love. That is what I used to think. It's love. But it's not. It's not that way because they keep hitting you. 23 They said they're not going to do it again, but then they 24 25 do it again and again and again. They should go to jail.

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Statement - Public 16 Martha Mercredi (Janelle & Shelly Mercredi) They don't get much jail time. They should go 25 years, 30 1 2 years for doing that. 3 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: So what I am hearing, maybe a little bit more education 4 5 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: Yes. 6 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: for 7 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: And they should go 8 to jail for a long time, too. 9 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: And jail. Okay. 10 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: And I'm hoping that they're learning, the young girls, they don't have to stay 11 there in those conditions. That is what I thought. I 12 13 thought that is what I had to do. I used tiptoe around 14 [Boyfriend 1], Janelle and Shelly's dad. I used to tiptoe 15 around him so he wouldn't get mad at me. That's what I 16 would do. 17 File charges against them. There are 18 restraining orders, but that doesn't work. It should be 19 something more. Get them out of town or something so the girls can feel safe with their kids. In a community years 20 21 ago, that's what they used to do is send somebody -- they 22 would kick them out of town. Kick them out and tell them 23 not to come back ever. 24 It is getting worse instead of better. 25 Maybe that's why I don't belong with anybody, because I'm

1 scared. I might get the wrong man again. But I know now, today, what I have to do if I ever end up in a relationship 2 3 and that happens. I know what to do. I know enough to leave him alone. Leave him. 4 5 I have boyfriends who are friends. I have 6 one of my exes here. He's phoning me all the time. "Let's 7 qo for coffee." "I know," I said. I went for a ride with 8 9 him one time. He tried to kiss me and I said, "No. You're 10 married. I don't go out with married men." He still won't 11 leave me alone. Today he still phones me. I'm home alone, but I say my grandson is here with me. 12 13 "Oh. Okay, then." 14 So you know. I think that's about all. 15 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: That is good. 16 Well, those were all the questions I had for you today. 17 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: That's all? Okay. 18 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Yes. If it is 19 okay with you, if you do not have anything to add at the 20 moment, I do not have any more questions. So if it is okay 21 with you, I will turn off the recorder, and we will be done 22 with the session. 23 MS. MARTHA MERCREDI: We're done? 24 MS. MARIE-AUDREY GIRARD: Yes. Unless you have something else you would like to share with us, but if 25
