Indigenous health concepts and promotion strategies were both utilized and informed. The development and maintenance of community connections (both Indigenous and non-Indigenous) was integral to this process. I developed and presented at various academic and non-academic conferences and forums. Applying to relevant grants and funding agencies was also integral to this role.
